MEETING OF THE AMERICAN BOARD OF COM-ISSIONERS FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS .- Several re ligious convocations of unusual importance ar nunounced to take place in this city during th ing week. Among these, the annual meeting of the American Board of Commissioners fo ittention. It is expected that more than a thou and delegates will be present on this occasion among which number will be included a large number of names from every section of the Union and not a few who occupy the most eminent positions in the branches of the Church which they r present. The sessions will be held in the New Square (Rev. Albert Barnes, pastor), and will com mence on Tuesday, the 4th inst., at 4 o'clock P. M. The object of this national gathering is the extension of Christ's kingdom by organized mis sionary effort; and as this is a subject in which Christians of every name are supposed to be interested, and as lucid views are likely to be elicited vith reference to it, from some of the ablest mind ions will be free to the public, it is not unlikely that the daily gatherings at the First Presbyterian Church will be overflowing. We learn that the characteristic hospitality of our citizens has been andsomely exhibited in assigning abundant priodations for all the strangers who are expected to attend.
