method of extracting a blue color from the straw of buckwheat : The straw should be gathered before the grain is quite dry, and placed on the ground in the sun; until it becomes sufficiently dry to be taken from the husks with facility. The wheat having been removed, the straw is piled up, moistened, and left to ferment until it is in a state of decomposition, when it will become of a blue color. This indicates the period when it should be gathered and formed into cakes, which are to be dried in the sun or in a stove. On these cakes being boiled in water, the water assumes a strong blue color, which will not change in sulphuric sold. It may, however, be turned into red with alkali, into a light black with bruised gall nuts, and into a beautiful green by evaporation. Stuffs dyed blue with this solution, which is to be used in the same way as vegetable matters o similar species employed in dying, become of a beautiful and durable color.
