Soon he revealed some of his body guard, immense peaks that stand around their king, looking towards him expectant and submissive. What a charming ride! Although in this instance, whenever the horses slackened heir rapid pace, the dust literally enveloped us. and an impatient French lady kept repeating the most pileous tone, quelle poussière, quelle pous-nère, we did not fail for a moment to enjoy it.: On both sides were mountains nearly as lofty as fount Washington, now frowning over our heads, low respectfully receding, while over and beyond them all was the majestic, hoary head of the Giant, surrounded by the various peaks that add to much dignity to him—the Monarch of them all.

The beauty increased with every mile of the way. We were in some of Nature's wildest doins - where her works seemed to be on exhibition to man. One longs to go nowhere but directly on towards the goal—this the way to Chamcuny emphatically does. It leads where the eager adnirer of Nature desires to go.
