Mr UP TO 12 O'CLOCK LAST NIGHT. Fire in the Astor House. MAN DURNED TO DEATH-A FIREMAN PROBABLY KILLED-GREAT DAMAGE TO THE BUILDING-IN-KILLED—GREAT DAMAGE TO THE BUILDING—INTEREZ ALARM AND EXCITEMENT.

A flow minutes before eight o'clock this morning, the drying room attached to the laundry in the basement of the Astor House was discovered to be on fire, having probably caught from the furnaces there used, or some imperfection of the Stetson, one of the proprietors, was the first to see it, discovering it as he passed down a back stairway. It was then breaking out from the door of the drying room in a ruddy blaze. The sizem was instantly given, and the firemen appeared with their usual promptness, but the flames had made considerable progress, burning the laundry and kitchen, and assending into the servants' departments in the second and third stories.

Here a poor fellow, named Thomas Brady, one of the hall waiters and a night watchman, was so badly burned that he will probably die. Me had been up all night, and went into his room only a few minutes before the fire broke out. In the confusion and alarm, he was entirely forgotten until the fire was raging at its fiercast height. A ferry ant girl then suddenly spoke to a gentleman who was adding the firemen. inquiring, "Have they got Tom Brady, out yet?" Who is Tom Brady, and where is be?" was the answer. She replied that sice had met him on the stairs ten minutes before the fire, and explained the situation of his room os: the third story. Some policemen and citisens theat fried to force their way to his room, but were driven back down the stairway by the beat and stifling smoke. It is impossible at present to ostimate the damage, but it cannot be less than fifteen or twenty thousand dollars. The Stetsons are fully insured in about a goven New York and New England offices.
