John 8 Jackson, proprietor of the Sunday Transcript, died in this city yesterday horning. He was a turner in early life, and enjoyed to carrent educational ndvantages. One of his utters was the father of the present Dietrich Attorney. His literary tastes were strongthened in a number of literary tastes were strongthened to be not strongthened in a number was a connected with newspapers, chiefly as a capitalist, until 1855, when he bought the Daily Times. This paper was managed with great ability by Mr Jackson, conjoined with William Moran, Eq. It shortly became a very profitable publication, and its extensive circulation made it coveted by the reigning political parties. Both Buchsnan and Fremont men made bids for its purchase. It finally fell into the hands of the Republicans, and was nominally conducted by J. Barclay Harding. Under Mr. Jackson's reperintendence the Times had pursued an impartial and independent course. It declined immediately after he left it.

In October, 1856, Mr. Jackson, in conjunction with Meers. Greene and Hawksworth, started the Sunday Transcript. The first number had a circulation of five thousand copies, and the fifth number circulated twelve thousand. It has since been a leading independent paper.
