A large number of letters, addressed to persons in the Southern States, were found in their possession, indicating that they were contemplating an early departure.

Intelligence of the arrest was telegraphed to the Secretary of State, and inquiry was made as to the disposition to be made of the prisoners. The reply from Mr. Seward directed the prisoners to be sent to Fort Lafayette. They were accordingly placed in charge of a suitable police force and forwarded at once to that sanctuary.
