tre of each blanket. Stockings will be needed the coming winter-balf-hose or socks, good sizes, one-fourth pound each. Let every mother, wife, and sister knit one

or more pairs. Let associations be formed in each county, with Let associations be formed in each county, with a treasurer at the county seat, with whom the stockings can be deposited and forwarded to the military store at Harrisburg. The United States contract price, twenty-five cents per pair, will be paid to each county treasurer, and thus a fund can be raised to supply the wants of volunteer families, to which every patriotic woman in the State can contribute her share.
