Letter from Princeton, N. J. [Correspondence of The Press.]

PRINCETON COLLEGE, Sept. 26, 1861. The recent excitement in college; cooling Secession preclivities beneath the pump; the suspension of three students from our State for the offence; their triumphal procession to the depot, and the general determination of the students to crush rebellion in our midst-all has given way to the wisdom and patriotic decisions of the faculty, and left us apparently a better people. Secession is dead in college, and its former advocates are doing what would be a delightful spectacle in the whole South, viz : living without any manifestation of hostility

To-day the tokens of God's favor have been highly encouraging, and especially so in their in-crease since morning as the cloud which rose like a man's head. We have had more than a Sabbath man s head. We have had more than a sabbath quietude—business offices, stores, and work-shops have all been closed, the street frequented only in passing to and from church, and, above all, a deep spiritual influence pervading everywhere. At seven o'clock this morning, religious services commenced, and have been continued at almost every hour during the day. Never before has the pro-clamation of a ruler been, in this place, the occasion of such assemblies—such earnest prayers such deep humility and dependence upon God as has been witnessed this day. The First Church was crowded before eleven o'clock— Church was crowded before eleven o'clock—the hour for service—had arrived. During the meeting, Dr. Hodge presented the following impromptu, yet beautiful, train of thought: "Such eager assemblies are this day in hundreds and thousands of towns throughout our land, and millions are bowing before God. He has wrought it all, and can we not see in it the assurance that our desires are heard? Yet we must not suppose our festing is meritorious. Moreover. not suppose our fasting is meritorious. Moreover, there is this day a national acknowledgment of God—of His being, His attributes, His sovereignty, and our dependence." Rev. Mr. Manu also made ne appropriate remarks. May we not trust that it will be done; yea, more, that Ged means to raise us up from our affliction and humility, and that He will fight our battles for us

These nominations have been made with as little regard to party politics as possible. The Judicial candidates are the experienced, able, and houses Judges who were elected by the people to their present positions fen years ago. It was the unanimous opinion of the Convention that the purity and efficiency of the Judiclary can only be maintained by a distinct separation of the effice from the contests of political parties; and that it would, therefore, be inexpedient, and hostile to the public interests, to remove from the bench, without cause, those who are acknowledged as loy at citizons, and have proved competent and pure in the administration of justice. For these reasons the Convention unanimously agreed to recommend to their follow-citizens the reelection of the present Judges.

All the nominees for the other offices are believed to be entitled to the confidence, and worthy to receive the votte of the people. The candidates for Sheriff, Register of Wills, Clerk of the Orphund Court, City Treasurer, and City Commissioner, were all nominated without a suggestion or hint from either of them, that either of them desired office. They were selected from a large number of names suggested to the Convention by our fellow-citizens, solely with reference to their loyalty, honesty, and capacity. Their election by the people will be the first important step towards purifying some of those offices of the corruption and dishenesty for which they are notorious. The practice of extorting illegal fees from every citizen who enters them on business, for which office fees are pavalle, has become so oppressive and offensive to the public as to demand a rebuce, which

Such an opportunity is now presented. Our candidates are publicly pledged to do so, and they are men who will neither forget nor violate their pledges. They know that we are earnest in our determination to put an end to such frauds, and they will help us do it. But, in this work, we must have the co-operation of our fellowecitiens of all parties. There is nothing that should divide us now; we all stand on the same principles—all, at least, who are loyal to the flag of our country—who are ready to defend it against all its onemies, and unfurl it again, and uphold it in its full glory in the rebellious States, where it has been insulted and trampled upon.

Our servants, all of them, must be loyal and Honesy as well as loyal. Unfortunately, there are many men among us who declare themselves for the Government, for the war and its vigorous prosecution, whose patricotism never goes beyond party lines, and is kept alive by the hope of Public Plunder. If we intend to protect and preserve the institutions of our country we must take care that such persons do not get control of them through our blind adherence to party nominations, or the influence and patronage of public offices.
