NAVAL AFFAIRS .- The United States re-NAVAL AFFAIRS.—The United States re-venue cutter Forward was yesterday lying in the stream, opposite the navy yard, awaiting supplies. No new arrivals at the yard have been reported since Tuesday. Large quantities of shell are ship-ped daily, from Reed-street wharf, by the firm of North, Chase, & North, for the Government arse-nal, near Frankford.

NAVAL INVESTIGATION.—The subject which Commander Crabbe has been ordered to investigate at this naval station is simply a difficulty between two contractors relative to a contract of 170,000 feet of white oak timber, valued at \$10,000. It is al-leged that one of the contractors failed to fulfit the contract in a specified time, and, by request of the naval constructor, the navy agent awarded it to another party, who was able to furnish the lumber. The first party thereupon appealed, and the navy agent is required to give testimony in the investigation which the Department ordered. The lumber referred to was used in the stam sloop Tusscarora. To the people at large the affair is merely a private squabble, which certain jaun-diced parties would, nevertheless, like to charge to corruption and general wrong-doing.
