CITY ITEMS. Professor Bache's Introductory Lecture at Jefferson College Last Evening.

The "introductory" to the course of lectures at Joffern Medical College, Tenth street, above Walnut, was delivered in the large lecture room of the college building, by Professor-Franklin Bache, last evening, in the prence of the full faculty, and a large attendance of students and graduates of the institution. The lecturer commenced by saying that as they had assembled for the purpose of inaugurating the annual course of lectures of this college, he hoped that the stuelents would find their sojourn in our city both pleasant and profitable. He had given himself much thought, with a view to making what he was about to say to them

of practical value. In the first place, a good method of study was all-important to their success. The two main duties of medical men were, to preserve human health and to restore it when impaired by disease. The extent to which a student could acquaint himself with anatomy at home, by the use of a skeleton and the bodies of lower animals, was enlarged upon, the lecturer endorsing the sentiment, that no man was justified in dissecting any part of the living body who had not dissected the dead. The connection which the science of chemistry sustains up the subject of materia medica, he gave it as an important rule to beginners not to read of any drug without having a specimen before them, if they wished practis colly to test its qualities. The sources of the articles embraced in materia medica were the three kingdoms of Nature-some were from the animal, more from the mineral, and most from the vegetable. The study, therefore, of the respective sciences of zoology, mineralogy, and botany, was of the highest importance

Chemistry, like anatomy, was mainly a demonstrative science, and needed to be seen to be understood. The science of medicine, as a whole, was divided into these three branches-medicine, surgers, and obstetrics; it was, nevertheless, a unit. His plan recommended to the student, he repeated, was to take up, first, the elementary branches, and then

what might be called the applied branches. Their attendance upon three full courses of lectures, or sessions was deemed necessary. Many thought that it was an important point achieved to gain a diploma at the earliest period consistent with the rules of an institution—a fallacy which the professor effectually exposed, showing that the advantages of such expedition were more than neutralized by the necessarily superficial knowledge upon which the student must commence his practice un-During the sessions he was quite aware that systems

tic reading could not be pursued. All that the student could get from books at this period was what would enable him to clear up points made by the professors. Upon the subject of thesis, the lecturer said the proper time to prepare it was during the summer preceding the student's last course. If it was deferred later than this, it was more likely to be executed in haste, and not fairly to represent the literary qualifications of the writer, and he need not remind them that the character of the thesis had very much to do in influencing the decisions of the faculty. Much good advice, of a more private character, was

also given; such as the importance of selecting good, quiet arding houses; rooming separately; guarding against undue exposure, and of being vaccinated, in case they were unprotected in this respect against a loathsome object of their studies, and that the honorable fulfilment of their parents' fond hopes, with regard to their success, was of infinitely more value than all the ephemeral plea sures which, if not avoided, might frustrate their design in scuding them to college. In conclusion, he said, that while the troubles of our

country had somewhat diminished the number of their class, they might rest assured that not the slightest abatement would be made on this account in the efforts of the faculty to advance the students' best interests. The lecture was brief and pointed, and was delivered in a pleasant and proper manner for such an occasion. It was not too dry and philosophical for general appreciation. For yet too familiar for the diguity of the sub ject, although it was enlivened with a vein of quiet humor that elicited frequent applause. The regular lectures of the course at this institution will commence this morning, at ten o'clock.

This danger, which is described as two low rocks from three to six feet high, and close together, on which the sea breaks heavily, lies in the direct track of vessel closely rounding Steward Island in proceeding to or from the southern settlements of New Zealand.

7.1-10 miles E by N ¾ N from Owen Laland, off Lord's River.

5.1-10 miles E by N ¾ N from the extreme of the Break Sea Irles.
