HEADQUARTERS, HOME GUARD, Oevonn, 15, 15861.—The Brigadier General, Commander of the Home Guard, having been duly elected on the second Monday of September, A. D. 1861, and on the third day of October, instant, his election having been confirmed by the SELECT COUNCIL OF THE CITY.
