The affairs of the old company are to be wound up during the year, and the new company commences its actual existence with the beginning of the new one, without any liabilities but its funded debt, which will stand as follows:

The accruing interest on this sum will be \$1,878,485. The net earnings for 1860 exceeded this sum by \$448, P21—the gross carnings being \$5,180,316—net \$1,827,-406. Assuming a similar ratio for expenses for 1861, as for 1860, the net for the former year will be \$1,986,862. Deducting from this sum the accruing interest, there would be left \$608,377 for the preferred shares. These cannot exceed \$8,000,000, and call for \$560,000 annually. This atement is correct in all but the estimates for expenses rate as for 1860. The estimate cannot be far out of the way. It shows that the net earnings for the year have exceeded by \$44,377 the interest on the debt of the company, and a sum equal to dividends at the rate of 7 cent. on the preferred stock. The company will enter the new year with greatly increased facilities for business, and with the prospect of much larger carnings for 2 than for 1861.

Practical mechanics like myself are not necessarily literary men, consequently yourself and readers will please excuse any want of elegance in my style, so long as I keep within the limits of truth.

Agreeably to an advertisement by the Postmaster, published in your columns, I, in company with other builders, called to examine the plans and specifications for a Post Office, to be erected on the Levy and Bailey lots, Chestnutstreet, west of the Custom House. We found the drawings on a scale of eight feet to one inch, devoid of detail and wholly without figures or explanations, except such as related to the general sizes of the building. No competent person was present to answer questions respecting the proposed work required to be done, and in turning toldine apecifications they were found containing pages and words sufficient for a building of twice the magnitude, but so stupidly arranged as to afford but a dim and dangerous light to the honest contractor who dared to bid on the meagre plans. The reason for this obscurity may perhaps be found in the architect's preface, where he states the plans to have been made for the Postmaster General; Mr. Adams, and Mr. Walboyn. Now, sir, according to the newspapers Mr. Adams is a Government contractor for public buildings, and if he is a bidder in this case what chance have the builders of Philadelphia with a stranger at whose instigation an unknown Boston architect, Mr. Brindlay F. Bryant, has prepared such mysterious plans and specifications? Even the stone work is so obscurely described that I heard one of our most intelligent marble masons, Mr. E. Greble, ask an architect, who happened to be passing, to aid him in deciphering what related to his particular branch.

branch. Notwithstanding this palpable intention to discoura, and defeat Philadelphia builders, I am determined ties every means within my power to obtain a fair understanding of the wants of the Government, and bid accordance with the amount of information which I may be able to obtain.

It is certainly a singular sequel to the statement in your columns of yesterday—it that Pennsylvania had incre troops in arms in support of the Government than any other State*—to find Philadelphia architects and builders ignored in the construction of a national building upon her streets. Where are now the patriotic and disinterested architects and builders who denounced our public building contract last year, because the plans were on such a small seale and not fully figured over, though an architect was present to answer every question? Come forward, ye immaculate Sloans, Le Bruns, Hoxies, and Killgores, prove your consistency and love of fair dealing, by fully ventilating this miserable scheme for squandering forty-nine thousand dollars for a temporary Post Office.
