NEW BRINGES OVER THE SCHUYLKILL.—The railroad bridge of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, in course of ersetion below Christian street, on the Schuylkill, will probably be completed during the ensuing month. The work upon this bridge was commenced in July, 1860, and so far as concerns the masonry is already finished. A portion of the iron superstructure, at the western end, connecting the tressel work with the first pier, has been placed in position. This superstructure is of the company's own manufacture, and is forwarded to its destination from their shop at Altoona, having been prepared from a plan submitted by the resident engineer, at that place.
