Attempted Murder at the Tombs. FELIX SANCHEZ STARS A PRISONER.

About three o'clock yesterday afternoon Felix Sanchez, who is confined in the city prison to an-Sanchez, who is confined in the city prison to answer a charge of murder, attacked the keeper employed upon the third tier of the prison, and attempted to take his life. The keeper, it appears, had declined to permit Sanchez the use of the ladder without the consent of the warden of the prison, and Sanchez determined upon revenge. He was tried and convicted of the murder; but the law abolishing the death penalty murder; but the law aborisming the death penalty was passed in the meanwhile and sentence was not executed. Sanchez concerted with James Stephens a plan to murder the keepers and escape from the Tombs, but perfidiously betrayed the plot in hope of securing his own liberty.—N. 1. Post of Monday.
