Discourse on Africa by the Rev. Alexander Crummel, AT THE CHURCH OF THE EPIPHANY, LAST EVENING. There was a large congregation assembled at the Church of the Epiphany, last evening, to hear an aidress from the Rev. Alexander Crummel, (colored,) clergyman of the Potestant Episcopal Church in Liberia, on "The Advancement and Prospects of Missions, Commerce, Industry, and Civilization along the West Const of Africa." The preliminary devotional exercises were conducted by the Right Rev. Bishop Potter, assisted by Rev. Mr. Cracraft, rector of the Epiphany. Mr. Crunmel is well remembered by many of our citiens-having been formerly paster of a church in this city-as a highly talented and efficient minister of the ospel; and by his colored brethren—a liberal sprinkling of who a were in attendance last evening—he is deserved ly cherished as a notable example of the culture of which the African, under favorable circumstances, is susceptible. Mr. Crummel was educated in England, and in his manner and address evinces the polish of a scholar, and the spirit of an intelligent divine. Although an unmixed

African, there is scarcely anything in either his matter He opened by reminding his hearers of the hitherto hand, and the transition state through which it was now passing, under the dawning light of Christianity and civilization. Physical causes, which he explained, had, in a great measure, cut Africa off from the influence of all the old civilizations. But the long night of ignorance was now gradually giving way to a brighter day, through the power of philanthropic and missionary enterprise. The regenerative state of the negro race was, in some parts the first causes conducing to this end was the progress of commerce-commerce as it was to-day. Originally, commerce there had been but a robber, a devastator, and a murderer; but a healthy change was now in rapid progress. The first item enumerated and dwelt upon, in this connection, was the growth and exportation of cot ton, which was annually assuming greater importance.

As an evidence of the progress of Christianity in Western Africa, he said that, within a comparatively brief bundred schools had been established, and more than two thensand children were now receiving instruction in the English language; the various churches numbere some thirteen thousand communicants, and the Holy Scriptures had been reduced to writing in twenty-five It was undoubtedly true that the English language was soon destined to be the language of Africa, thus placing
