SINGULAR CASE OF CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVI-DENCE-A THIFF CONVICTED BY AN ENVELOPE .--The value of circumstantial evidence was never more plainly evinced than at the hearing of Jos. H. Among the articles was a breast-pin, which was wrapped up in a piece of an envelope. The paper attracted the at-tention of the detective, and upon a closer examination he discovered that it bore the address of a volunteer in Colonel McLean's regiment, then encampeu near Wash-fing of the Descetive force, wrote to the colonel, asking information of the oddier's character and whereabouts during the month of November. On the following day he received a visit from the individual inquired allout, who brought with him a recummendatory letter from his colonel. Mr. Franklin showed him the envelope, and asked him whether he had any suspicion as to the perpe-trator of the robbery.
