The prominent event of the day in the monetary world was the suspension of specie payments by the Canks of all the large cities, a measure long foreseen by all classes of business men, and by them received with favor and commendation. This step, in view of the disposition recently manifested to withdraw denosits in specie, and have them placed in bank vaults as "special" deposits, and the prospect of a heavy drain under orders from abroad to sell stocks and remit the proceeds to Europe, was judicious. No effect was produced upon stocks by the suspension, and the advance that followed uncement of the supposed settlement of the Msaon and Slidell case was sustained. The Philadelphia Stock Board adjourned its regular essions for the day upon the announcement of the death of one of its members, Mr. C. E. D'Invilliers. Reading Railroad shares sold privately at 172: Pennsylvani market was unsteady, under telegraphic advices from New York, where a heavy advance was reported in the orning, followed by a fall, and subsequently by a parial recovery. We hear on all sides an expression of the opinion that the Philadelphia banks should avail themselves of the privilege accorded to them by the Legislature, and save us from being flooded with the bills of all kinds of outside banks, by issuing small notes themselves.
