Sove ander Lieut Col. Brown, which proceeded from Johnstown to soon the country south of Grand river to the neighbourhood of Clinton. In these operations, sixteen wagons, loaded with tents and supplies, and one hundred and fifty prisoners were captured. The enemy's force was thoroughly dispersed.

On the morning of the 16th, Lieut. Col. Brown's forces rejoined the command. Knowing that there must still be a large force of the enemy north of us, I moved forward slowly, on the 18th, towards Warrensburg, and, when near that town, the spies and scouts I had sent out before murching from Sedalis, in the direction of Lexington, Waverly, and Arrow. Rock, reported to me that a large force was moving from the two latter places, and would encamp that hight at the mouth of Clear creek, just south of Mildord.

T posted the main body of my command between Warrensburg and Knob Noster, to close all outlet to the south between those two points, and despatched seven companies of cavalry (five of the Lowe First, and two of the Fourth regular cavalry),

spatched seven companies of cavalry (five of the lows. First, and two of the Fourth regular cavalry), afterwards reinforced by another company of regular cavalry and a section of artillery, all under command of Colonel J. C. Davis, Indiana volunteers, to march on the town of Milford, so as to turn the enemy's left and rear and intercept his retrest to the northeast, at the same time directing Major Marshall, with Merrill's regiment of horse, to march from Warrensburg on the same plont, turning the enemy's right and rear, and forming junction with Colonel Davis.

The main body of my command occupied a point four miles south, and ready to advance at a moment's notice, or to intercept the enemy's retrest south. Oclonel Davis marched promptly and vigorously with the forces under his command, and at glate hour in the afternoon came upon the west side of Blackwater, opposite the mouth of Clear. Creek. His pickets were immediately driven in across the stream, which was deep, miry, and impaseable, except by a long, narrow bridge, which the enemy occupied in force, as is believed, under Colonel Magoffin.

Colonel Davis brought forward his force, and directed that the bridge be carried by assault. The two, companies of the Fourth regular cavalry being in advance, under the command respectively of Lieutenant Gordon and Lieutenant Amory, were designated for that service, and were supported by the five companies of the First lows cavalry.

Lieutenant Gordon, of the Furst Iown cavalry, Lieutenant Gordon, with the utmost gallantry and vigor, carried the bridge in fine style, and immediately formed his company on the opposite side. He was promptly followed by the other companies. The force of the enemy posted at the bridge retreated precipitately over a narrow, open space, into the woods, where his whole force was posted. The two companies of the Fourth cavalry formed in line at once, advanced upon the enemy, and were received with a volley of small arms, muskets, rises, and shotgum. One man was killed, and eight wounded, by this discharge. With one exception, all belonged to Company D, Fourth cavalry, Lieutenant Gordon.

Lieutenant Gordon himself received several balls through the cap Our forces still continuing to press forward, and the enemy finding his retreat south and west cut off, and that he was in presence of a large force, and at best could only prolong the contest a short time, surrendered at discretion. His force, reported by colonel commanding, consisted of parts of two regiments of infantry and three companies of cavalry, numbering in all thirteen hundred men, among whom there were three colonels (Robinson), demander, and Magoffin), one lieutenant colonel (Robinson), one major (Harris), and 'fifty-one commissioned company officers. About five hundred horses and mules, seventy three wagons, heavily loaded with powder, lead, tents, subsistence, stores, and supplies of various kinds, fell into our hands, as also a thousand stand of arms. lying off Fortress Monroe, noticed the movement, and communication was immediately made with our gunboats, steamers, &c, who got under weigh, (some slipping their cables,) and crowding all steam, hastened after "secesh," who, covering the schooner, blazed away defiantly with her guns long after she was secure under the batteries of Craney Island. The chase was given up when within range of the armament of the ormidable forts there erected, and the several hoats tried their accuracy of aim and solidity of metal upon the batteries on Sewall's and Willoughby's Points. The fire was returned, one of the enemy's bombs whizzing over us, and another failing within pistol-shot of our taffrall, with a roar and a hiss that was decidedly refreshing to our sea boys, who were "spiling for a muss." The shot and shell from our little facet were well directed, the shell bursting on or near the beach, and the shot from the rifle guns (Dahlgren) thundering up the The whole force captured, with their train, were The whole force captured, with thoir train, were marched into the samp of the main body, reaching there about midnight. Many arms were thrown away by the enemy, in the bushes and creek, when he surrondered, and have not yet been found. It was impossible to furnish any accurate account of the number of prisoners, arms, or horses, when I telegraphed, as they surrendered just at dark, and were brought into camp at a late hour of the night. The weather was bitterly cold, and the troops marched as early as possible the next moraing for Sedalia and Otterville. As the prisoners and arms were at once sent down to St. Louis, I have not yet had the opportunity of making an accurate embankment toward the rebel breastworks. Of course, not having orders to continue the firing, wo reluctantly steamed away, casting many a wistful glance at the captured vessel beyond our assistance. afar up the roads, and inwardly praying for a day of satisfaction, which we trust may be near at hand. The alacrity with which the soveral crews responded to the "engagement call," is much to be ommended; and the Delaware, under the tuition of her able and energetic commander, will be found at all times ready to do battle for her country, and uphold the honor of that navy which is rising into significance that threatens, ere long, to eclipse by Colonel J. C. Davis, and by Major Torrence, Iowa cavalry.

The forces under Colonel Davis behaved with great gallantry, and the conduct of Colonel Davis himself was distinguished.

The Movements of General Price.

A correspondent, writing, from St. Louis, under date of Dec. 27th, says:

A captain in one of the Kansas regiments, who has been for several weeks a prisoner in Price's camp, has arrived in this city. Price released him on the 20th iteratin, and gave him a safeguard, with which he started for Sedslia. Before travelling many miles he was stopped by a straggling party of 25 rebels, who, declaring that if Price had released him they would not, carried him into their camp, and kept him under guard. But the same night the captain, whose Kansas education had not been neglected, invited his captors to join him in a little convivality. Like their class everywhere, they deemed whisky that touch of nature which makes the whole world kin; and accepted with great alsority. They drowned their animosity in the flowing bowl, and the flowing bowl was too much for them. In the classic words of Artemus Ward, "it ginerally is;" At Jast, when they had given way and fallen selecy the captain crept out of the tent, cluded the guard, and made his escape. He reports that Price has 10,000 men and 32 pieces of artillery, and is again falling back toward the Arkansas line.

ENGLISH COMMENTS ON THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

New York, Dec. 31 .- The steamer Eina arrived at 8 clock this morning, with dates by telegraph from Lou-The Etna brings only the Irish mails.

The message of President Lincoln claimed great attention, nota libstanding that the public feeling was deeply engrossed with the death of Prince Albert. The silence of the Fresident's message on the Trent Affair was the subject of much conjecture and comment. It was generally regarded as a loop-hole for escape, and gave some hopes of peace, although the general construction was warlike.

The London Times says that nothing can be more ungracious than the President's treatment of the foreign Powers for their forbearance. A gracious and courteous acknowledgement was due. The Times also devotes an article to the report of the Sectary of the Navy, which it treats with ridicule, and denounces as an unparalleled crime the project of blocking up ports by sunken vessels. The Post treats the message as undeniably warlike, and, although remarking on the silence relative to the Trent affuir, says it was scarcely within the ordinary scope of a message. It also charged the President with ingualitude in dealing with the maritime Powers. In the same critical is any that the despatch to Bord Lyons was simple and final—it is an ultimatum in itself.

THE CAUSE AND EFFECT OF THE SUSPEN-SION OF SPECIE PAYMENTS.—The suspension of specie payments by the banks has occasioned no surprise in mercantile or financial circles. The result was predicted at least three weeks since by Mr. Winslow, editor of the Commercial List, and other quotable authorities, and

at least three weeks since by Mr. Winslow, editor of the Commercial List, and other quotable authorities, and the community were well propared for it. The rate of exchange on Europe had reached a figure which made shipments of specie thence a profitable investment. Added to this, the enormous subscriptions to the Government loan had absorbed a large amount of the discount line of the banks, and together with the immense drain on the scaboard from the banks of the interior for the precious metal, had so rapidly reduced the stock on hand, that one institution alone lost, within ten days, one million of dollars. The drain would, of course, have continued but a very few days longer, before the entire reserve specie fund in all the banks would have been drawn out. As it is now, they are enabled to change notes of the lower denominations, discount literally for all their customers, increase their circulation, and extend to the community facilities for the transaction of business which could not have been otherwise obtained. The Government finances and the suggestions of Secretary Chase still confinue to engage the attention of the public. It is stated that the Committee on Ways and Means of both branches of Congress have a bill now before them pending for a further increase of the tariff on a number of articles, and the subject with come up in a few days for discussion.

These sudden and vexations changes in the tariff are submitted to by the merchants with commondable readiness, satisfied as they are that the revenue thus accruing is for the support of the great Union cause.

The banks of Philadelphia have not for many years been so well forified with specie as at present; yet, in order to reserve it, and be prepared for future containg series, it became absolutely necessary for them to shut the gates.

Another effect of the suspensions, it is stated, will probably be to induce speculations on the part of the banks themselves, which, though having an immense quantity of specie in their vaults, are not obliged to pay it out. A prominent banker on Third street was heard to exclaim, yesterday, "that he did not know what to do with his money." The inference is clearly—speculation.

Within the last few weeks the agents of British capitalists, anticipating the action that has occurred, withdrew their deposits or sold out their stocks, and the money was either placed in bank upon "special deposit," or shipped to Europe. We understand that about the first of January (to-day) \$40,000,000, or eight millions of pounds sterling, would be due abroad by capitalists in this country, being the interest upon bonds, etc. We doubt whether the amount thus falling due is as great as this. At any rate, the exportation of the specie has been effectually prevented.
