This request, however, was not compiled with in many of the wards, but as a general rule was observed. The People's party, on the other hand, was desirous of allowing the elements opposed to Democracy to remain as heretofore in statu quo; or, in case of a change, they considered the State Committees the proper body to suggest and organise asy reforms.  CITY FINANCES.—The annual report of the Gity Controller has been completed. The financial matters of the oily are thus set forth: Total appro-priations for the year, including loans, \$5,884,-484,56, and warrants on this sum were counter-signed to the smount of \$5,099,644.66, leaving a balance to merge of \$751,105.09; this balance in-cludes Bic6,387.22 of the loan for the relief of the families of volunteers; \$116,393.64 of the loan for the metry and dofence of the oily : S187,009.90 of the Chestant street bridge loan; \$68,415.03 of the school loan; 10,797.38 of the water loan, and \$14,-282.91 of the loan for road damages and bridges; making a total of balances still standing to loan account of \$4565,286.68, and leaving the sam of \$185,910 31 as the amount unexpended by the va-rious departments of the oity.
