EXTRACT FROM THE LAST SPEECH OF A. BRADEN AT DOUGLASVILLE.

We beg leave to announce to our friends and neighbors that we are about to issue...

THE LATEST NEWS. The active preparations now being made at Cairo indicate that an early advance of our troops will take place from that point.

Before many days elapse we hope to hear of their crushing out of the rebellion in Missouri.

It is now generally expected in Louisiana that General Grant will take the command of the army from the hands of the rebels.

The steamer Louisiana, which arrived at New Orleans last week from Hamburg, brought an unusually heavy cargo of merchandise.

Most of the brigades and regiments engaged in the late battle at Mill Springs, Kentucky, have made their official reports to Gen. Thomas.

The speech of Mr. Hooper, in the House to-day, was listened to with marked attention.

Mr. Gladstone treated his constituents at a banquet given at the Crystal Palace.

Among the large amount of correspondence found in the pockets of the late rebels, we were able to secure official letters to justify the belief that the Union sentiment in East Tennessee is still strong.

On the 10th of November, Major Sloman, commanding the rebels at Loudon, Tenn., wrote to Colonel Wood as follows:
