Resofred, That in case the Senators from Pennsylvania, on an investigation of the case, should come to the conclusion that the substance of the charges set forth in this preamble is established against said Bright, by the vidence, that he is, in thought or dued, an enemy to our cause, then they, the said Senators, are hereby instructed to vote for the expulsion of the said Bright, whether, in their opinion, there may or may not be sufficient evidence to convict him of treason in a court of justice.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

THE MONEY MARKET. PHILADELPHIA, February 4, 1862. We have reason to believe that the plan set forth in The Press of yesterday morning for the prevention of a gorge of United States demand notes in the financial centres, and their consequent depreciation, has met with thoughtful attention and favorable consideration as well in financial circles here as at the national capital. The following recommendation has been to-day numerously signed by the most intelligent of our bankers, merchants, and political economists, and is forwarded to Washington this evening in the hands of a gentleman well known for his financial ability and statesman-like views: "The treasury-note bill now before the House of Representatives provides for the issuing by the Government of one hundred and fifty millions of demand notes, which notes are to be a legal tender.

"There is no provision in the bill for a large class of dealers who may be willing and anxious to promote the circulation of these bills in their business operations, but cannot afford to lock up their capital by making them a permanent investment

circulation of these bills in their business operations, but cannot afford to lock up thoir capital by making them a permanent investment.

"In order that justice may be rendered to that class, and to prevent the depreciation of the notes by throwing millions on the market without some place of rest, it is proposed that the Government shall allow any person or persons, or corporation, to deposit with any of the United Status depositories these notes, in sums of not less than five hundred dollars and upwards, for which they shall receive interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum, provided said deposit is left for thirty days or more; and abould the deposit be withdrawn before the expiration of thirty days no interest shall be allowed. Certificates shall be issued for said deposits, which shall be transferrable, the Government reserving the right to say when said deposit shall cease.

"Unless some provision of this kind is adopted, a large excess of these notes will at times lie on the market, and they will inevitably sell at more or less discount, and of course the Government will have to pay enhanced prices for all their supples, which will more than counterbalence any interest on deposits. The circulation will necessarily depend upon the business of the country, which varies at seasons. Sometimes, the whole amount will be required, particularly when the crops are going foward; at other times they will not all be needed, and it is for this time of piethora a remedy is required, which the undersigned believe will be furnished by the adoption of the foregoing suggestions."

The mere menual labor of signing the notes for the first fifty millions of these demand notes was much greater than any one would sunness without we will be received.

first fifty millions of these demand notes was much greater than any one would suppose, without a mathe-matical calculation. The signing of the first fifty milliens occupied a force of about thirty clerks more than three months, one man signing his name nearly four thousand times in an hour. To sign the notes which are to constitute the additional hundred millions would occupy the same force of clerks nearly nine months, and an additional force of signers will certainly be necessary, if the Government is to derive the required advantage from the new issue.

The present system looks only to a simple issue of the seme note. Under the proposed plan, the necessity of immediate issue of the whole amount of the notes would be obviated to the extent of the amount deposited, which could be at once put into circulation again, and much time and labor be thereby saved.
