FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL. THE MONEY MARKET. PHILADELPHIA, FODTUARY 7, 1862.
The action of the House of Representatives, at Washington, Yesterday, in passing the legal-tender treasury-mote bill, met with a hearty endorsement from all classes to-day. The stock market was particularly buoyant, and arise in prices was noted. Only one general legret was expressed in financial circles, to the effect that Congress ought first to have passed a law providing for taxation in an amount amply sufficient to establish the credit of the Government on a secure basis. But it is understood that the pledge already given by Congress, in its joint resolu-
tion, will be redeemed within a few days, by the enactment of an ample tax law, on which the credit of these motes and the loans of the Government will rest and; the passage of the demand-note bill is therefore accepted as the best measure within the reach of Congressional legislation.
Many who at first doubted the propriety of the legal- tender clause have been led to give it their sanction and support; as the recent action of hostile banks has led to the greatest confusion in the transaction of every-day business. It is a positive relief from bank inconsisten- ties to have the demand notes stamped as money by Go- vorument. Everybody will know what to depend upon in trade
and business, and the adequate taxation promised for their support will make them better than any bank notes for currency. They will come to have the same weight with the people as bank paper has hitherto enjoyed. The faith of the people in their Government may be re- presented and recognized as well in its stamp on paper as in its stamp on metal. The necessity for making these notes a legal tender arises directly from the action of the banks themselves.
They suspended specie payments at first and then paid their last instalments on account of the seven and three-tenths per cent. loan in the demand notes of the Government. As soon as they had accomplished this object they attempted to discredit them. A portion of the banks nobly endeavored to give the Government the benefit of their circulation, and received them freely on deposit and on payment of debts. These four d them-
selves victimized, however, by their fellow-banks when the balances at the clearing houses came to be settled, and were obliged, in self-defence, to pursue the same unpatrictic course. The passage of the bill will change all this. Bank notes will give place to the Government notes, which will pass at the full value of their face in all business transactions.
Some think it would have been better if the plan pro- posed in The Press, of having these notes received by the Government on deposit bearing interest, had been incor- porated into the bill. The Government would thereby have had the benefit of the money of all who were willing to give it the use of their temporary surplus funds, and who could not make it con- yenient to make a permanent investment by buying
loans. We learn that Thomas Kimber, Esq., is in Washington, on behalf of many of our prominent business men, financiers, and bankers, urging some such legislalation at the hands of Congress, and he may yet be successful. We have already expressed the opinion that this plan would, if adopted, help very materially by keep the notes from gorging in the financial centres, until they work their way into the hands of the people gene-
raily. The passage of the bill by the Senate, however, can hardly be doubted, and the tax bill will speedity follow. The people of the North have scarcely begun to feel the pecuniary burden of the war. They are in earnest in its support, and willing to meet its requirements. They are not only willing, but able, and the Government
has only to ask and to have. They wish for no half-way policy. They would have the war to be prosecuted vigorously and successfully, and they believe that the more they pay in the beginning the less they will have to pay in the aggregate. The resources of the people of the Northern States are as yet almost unbouched. In them lie the means of replenishing the National Trea-
sury and sustaining the Government credit everywhere. The public revenue must be brought up to a sufficient sum to guaranty to public creditors of all grades the payment of their claims in full, with interest. When this is done, there will be no difficulty in obtaining all the money the Government shall need, whatever its amount may be. Meanwhile, and only meanwhile, and as a matter of pressing necessity, taken up
out of its proper order in consequence of the urgency of the case, the legal-tender treasury-note bill will be passed. The Treasury will be relieved from embarrass- anent, and the details of the tax bill can be arranged with more justice and care than they would receive if the tax bill were to be hurried through Congress, under the pressure which is necessarily exercised by the Treasury
