The Eighth ward rates the highest in regard to furniture; the smounties \$433,750. The Nineteenth ward only returns \$300, and the Seventeenth is blank. In horses, the Twenty-fourth ward is the first on the list. The assessment is \$72,860. The Third ward brings up the rear with \$1,330. The Eighth ward has the greatest amount in carriages, viz, 32,118, while the Third ward is put down at \$80.
