The Government Hospitals of the City. There are five Government hospitals in this city. They are located as follows: No. 1, corner of Broad and Cherry streets; No. 2, corner of Twenty-second and Uallowhill streets; No. 3, corner of Fifth street and York avenue ; No. 4, Twenty-third and Lombard streets; No 5. Christian street, below Tenth. These buildings have a united capacity for the accommodation of about three thousand patients.

GENERAL MILITARY HOSPITALS.

The Sanitary Commission, in a recent report, gives the following points which must be attended to in the conduct and arrangement of army hospitals. Large public build-ings, such as churches, concert.rooms, and public halls, are commonly (mployed as general military hospitals. It s often necessary to make extensive alterat them to their new use. Special regard should be paid to ventilation. The doors and windows usually require to be enlarged, especially in an upward and downward di-nection; or numerous holes six inches square may be made through the walls near the floors and ceilings, rection; or numerous holes six inches square may be made through the walls near the floots and ceilings, There should be doors and windows opposite to each other, so as to allow the air to pass freely through in all direc-tions. The patients should not be placed in stories below the level of the ground, or but slightly raised above it, as experience has shown that the upper stories are much more salubrious. The beds should be raised from the floor, being placed on iron bedsteads whenever they can be obtained. No two bedsteads whenever they can innecessary articles should be in the wards, as they co-ting placed on iron bedsteads whenever they can be obtained. No two bedsteads whenever they can innecessary articles should be in the wards, as they co-ting valuable space, and absorb noxious vapors. Care should be taken that the windows do not open upon any receptacles of foul air. Desides the principal hospital building there should be is mail detached houses reserved for special cases. Great attention should be gait to urains connected with the hospital, to prevent them from con-taninating the atmosphere. Patients who are able to rise from their beds -hould est in adjoining rooms or tents. The wards of the huspitals should be divided into three classes, riz: surgical, medical, and convaluseont. To every division of one hundred beds there should be at the hospital is prepared, the compound fractures should be placed in the most accessible wards, and injuries of the same character should be placed in the same wards. When wine or spirifis are directed, the surgeon should see them administered. To preserve the purity of the air, the wards should be frequently whitewashed with line. The adjacent grounds should be well drained, and the severs abould be frequently furshed. THE OENTRAL HOSPITAL.

THE GENTRAL HOSPITAL.

The DESTRAL HOSPITAL. This is located at the southeast corner of Broad and Cherry streets, in the massive brick building (sanded in imitation of stone) formerly occupied as a freight depot by the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company. It is the headquarters of the surgeon-in-chief, and is the largest of the five buildings. Its dimensions are 110 feet by 150. It has been furnished with between five and six hundrad hedls, which are hy no means crowded. The hundred bede, which are by no means crowded. The sick wards occupy the whole extent of the building, and every bod may be seen at a glance, there being no inter-rening partitions. It is well ventilated by four shafts (formerly used as hatchways). Improved cooking appa-ratus has been introduced, and also a dumb-waiter for ratus has been introduced, and also a dumb-waiter to sending food, etc., to patients on the upper floor. H. Evas. These gentlemen are now kept constantly employed in attending to the nouncross wands of their patients. On Wednesday last, 260 soldiers arrived here from the vari-ous hospitals of Washington. The cars containing them were run diractly to the hospital door, thus avoiding a transfer at the Baltimore depot, which would have con-surged much time and must have entailed much danger upon the invalids. About a dozen of the men were so badly wounded that it was necessary to carry them in on stretchers. The others were aile to walk. DUTIES OF MILITARY SURGEONS

DUTIES OF MILITARY SURGEONS. The principal duties of the medical staff of the army are completend of to the two classes of military byzicne and military therapeutics. The former of these two class-es, although it attracts much less popular attention than the latter, is by no means inflerior to it in practical im-portance. The statistics of armics clearly reveal the fact, that a much larger number of soldiers die from disease, resulting from unfavorable hygienic circumstances, than from wounds inflicted in battle. "The duties of a mili tary surgeon consequently involve a high degrees of ro-sponibility, and upon their skilful and faithful perform-ance the efficiency and success of armies is largely de-pendent."

PREPARATION OF FOOD AND DRINKS.

PREPARATION OF FOOD AND DRINES. The United States Sanitary Commission, in their re-port to the New York Academy of Medicine, on minitary hygiene and therapeutics, says: It is highly important, not only that the supply of food should be ample, but that its quality should be good, and that it should be in such a form that it can be prepared for use as speedily and with as tittle haber as possible. There should be a regular allowance of meat and vegetables at dinner, whenever it is practicable to furnish them. Soldiers should not be coolined for a long time to salted meat; but fresh meat should always be allowed whenever it can be obtained. The use of fresh vegetables is of very great importance, as a means of guarding against sourcy. Fruits should also be provided in their season, either in a fresh or dried state. sh or dried state.

MEDICAL CADETS.

MEDICAL CADETS. The medical cadets provided for by a recent act of Congress have already been appointed. Three of them are to be attached to each hospital, where they are re-quired to be always in attendance. The cadets are in fact students of medicine. They are required to assist in drossing wounds, etc., and thus have an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the practical requirements of their prolession. At the same time they are familiarized with the rules and regulations if the pervice, some of which are different in military from toivil hospitals. The Government has provided them liberally with all the requisites of the position.
