They are in want of light reading, imaginative works, periodicals, etc., Many of them would be speedily vived if condiments, fruit, preserves, etc., were in their gach. They have inherited these discases through strictic zeal, and should not be forgotten in the midst of the general delight.

We passed some hours yesterday among these poor fellows, and found them anxiously intent upon the war news from the West. Indeed, many of them, attributed their liveliness and invigoration to the exhiliarating effect of the news from Roanoke, Donelson, and Arkansas. Those who could walk or sit, were conversing in group upon the probable results of the victories, and several were bewailing the fate that had made them infirm while such glorious fighting was being enacted upon the field "Who wouldn't rather die out there," said one, " rathe than mope and suffer here." The largest of these hospigals are located at Broad and Cherry streets and at Fifth and Buttonwood streets. The soldiers of the war of 1812 will also celebrate the

saniversary of the birth of Washington on Saturday. Their meeting will be held in the Nisi Prius Court roor at 10 o'clock A. M.
