How Washington's Birthday was CELEBRATED N PHILADELPHIA SIXTY-TWO YEARS AGO. —A full account of the preparations that have been made to celebrate this (the 130th) anniversary of the Birthday of the Father of his Country will be found in another column. In order to give our re-ders an idea of how the ame event was celeberated in Philadelphia in 1800, we have compiled the following facts from files of papers of

that date:

In 1800 Congress was sitting in Philadelphia, and on the 6th of January of that year a resolution was adopted recommending the people of the United States to assemble on the 22d of February next, for the purpose of paying suitable honors to the nemory of General George Washington. On the nameday, the President sent down a special message, announcing that he had approved and signed the resolution. The annexed proclamation was accordingly issued: By the President of the United Stales:

A PROCLAMATION. Whereas, the Congress of the United States have this day resolved, . That it be recommended to the people of the United States to assemble on the 22d of February the united States to assemble on the 23d of sections, next, in such numbers and manner as may be convenient, publicly to testify their grief for the death of Gen. George Washington, by suitable eulogies, orations, and discourses, or by public prayers; and that the President be requested to issue a proclamation for the purpose of carrying the foregoing into enect;" now, therefore, I, John Adams, President of the United States of America, debrying president of the United States of America, the breathy proclaim the same accordingly. John Adams, Fresident of the Omer States of Adams, do hereby proclaim the same accordingly.

Given under my hand and the seal of the United States, at Philadelphia, the sixth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred, and of the independence of the said States the twenty-fourth.

At Philadelphia the anniversary was respectfully observed. The greater number of citizens kept their houses abut, and abstained from business. At the several churches eulogies were pronounced by the clergy in the presence of la ge congregations. At noon the Uncinnati assembled in the state House and marched in procession to the German Lutheran Church, preceded by several mitiary corps. After devotional exercises. Major William Jackson delivered an oration. A Masonic procession sits left the same place at ten o'clock, A. M., and proceeded to Zion Church. In the centre of this large gathering was a monument, borne by four Past Grand Masters, supporting a golden urn, which was surmounted by an eagle with wings expanded, and holding in its beak a scroll, in the bgure of a heart, with a suitable inscription. Bev. Dr. Magaw delivered the oration.

Gongress, then in session, adjourned for the day. A resolution to meet in the chamber at half past twelve, and thence march to the church in Race street to hear an enlegium, passed the Senate, and was carried into effect; but in the House it was lost by a small majority, some of the members desiring to attend the Bomau Cathelic Church which had tenuered an invitation on the occasion.
