About half of them are covered with boards, and the rest with the cauvas that had been used in co-vering hay. PROPOSED ARMORY ON THE DELAWARE RIVER—THE IRON ARMOR FOR OUR FRIGATE.—The plates for our Low iron-caid frigate are being turned out daily from the Bristol Forge. Works, above Philadelphia. These iron plates are fifteen feet long and four and a half inchest thick. In width they differ. Some are twenty-eight and a hulf inches, others one inch less. A second series, designed to go below the water line, are to equal the others in length, but will be somewhat lighter. Their edges are all planci and grooved after they reach the city. CATHOLIC RULES FOR THE OBSERV-ANCE OF LENT IN THE DIOCESE OF PHILADALPHIA.— The Bight Rev. Biebop of this Gatholic Diocese has is-sued from his Cathedral the following 'rules for the ob-servance of the forthcoming Lent': The first day of Lent, Ash-Weinesday, falls this year on the 5th of March.
I. All the failffull, who have completed their twenty-first year, are bound to observe the fast of Lent, unless dispensed for legitimato reasons.
One meel a day only is allowed, except on Sundays.
This meal is not to be taken until about model.
On those days on which permission is granted to est meal, even by way of condiment.
A collation or partial meal is allowed in the evening. The general practice of pious Christians limits its quan-tity to the fourth part of an ordinary meal.
Bread, butter, cheese, fruit of all kinds, salads, vertables, and fish, are permitted at the collation. Milk and eggs are prohitited.
Toutom has made it lawful to drink in the morning some warm liquid such as tea and coffee, or thin choco-late med with water.
