Considerable consternation was caused in the neighborhood by the idea prevailing that the building contained benzine, and that an explosion would take place. The company have a large warehouse in Jayne street, and keep but a small quantity of oil in Second street. About 15 barrels of oil in the cellar were rolled out and saved. The company had on hand a large stock of lamps, &c., valued at \$10,000; insured in the Royal, American, and Penusylvania Companies. No. 86, on the north, occupled as a store and dwelling by Wm. Murtha, was conpied as a store and dwelling by Wm. Murtha, was considerably damaged by water. No. 40, the dry goods store and dwelling of S. V. R. Hunter, was flooded from top to bottom, and the contents much injured. Brooks' well-known confectionery store and eating-house was elightly damaged.

On Strawberry street, the hotel of John M. Gropner and the office of Mr. Bettle Paul were both damaged by water. No. 31, occupied on the first floor by W. Overfield, agent for the Lehigh Slate Company, and in the upper part by Wm. Grosholz, & Company, importors of French and German dry goods, was much injured by water. The last-named firm are insured in the Koyal and other companies. Mr. (i. W. Wooten, the agent of the oil company, says Mr. (i. W. Wooten, the agent of the oil company, says that the fire commenced in this manner: He, in company with a boy, was engaged in testing the illuminating properties of different oils, and for that purpose had small quantities burning in sancers of water. By some means the contents of a saucer fell on to a lot of packing hay, and in an instant the whole nlace was invalued.
