EUROPEAN POLITICAL NEWS. NEW YORK, March 10.—The steamer City of Washington has arrived with Liverpool advices of

the 26th ult. ARREST OF CAPTAIN SEMMES OF THE SUMPTER. Advices from Gibraltar to the 18th say that the rebel pirate Sumpter still lay there with no signs of departure. The United States steamer Tuscarora remained in Spanish waters off Algesiras. A telegram from Madrid, dated the 25th, states

that the captain of the Sumpter had been arrested at fangiers, at the instance of the American consul and the commander of the Tuscarora, who went to Tangiers for the purpose.

It had been reported that the Sumpter appeared off Hyeres, south of France, on the 16th of February, which, of course, must have been incorrect. WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY IN LONDON. The Americans at London celebrated Washington's Birthday by a public breaking. Dr. Multvaine, Bishop of Ohio, presided. Minister Adams, Consul Murse, the two Secretaries of Logation, Cyrus W. Field, Dr. Macgowan, and others, were

present.

Mr. Adams, in a patriotic speech proposing the toast to the memory of Washington, said that it was well for Americans to think of his course at this time. The country was in the midst of a crisis long foreseen and feared; but by imitating Washington's great virtues they would conquer and subdue the mailign power which has sought to rule or due the malign power which has sought to rule or ruin. The strugglo is fearful, but there is no al-ternative. The assault upon the Government of the United States carries with it an aggressive principle, which, if not defeated, must, in the end, be fatal to freedom. It involves the acknowledg-ment of the prescriptive right of some men to rule over their fellows, and the Government must,

rule over their fellows, and the Government must, therefore, fully re-establish its fundamental doctrine at every hazard. He concluded by again calling for that patience and perseverance shown by Washington as the sure road to success.

The company owns over \$1.000,000 of the morts Chicago road, making a total of main-line of over 800 miles. The company owns over \$1,000,000 of the mortagae bonds, and \$850,000 of its share capital, under the new organization of this road. During the past year, a lease in perpetuity was taker, after much litigation, of the Sanbury and Erie road, a line of 288 miles of which 148 are completed. The early completion of this road is thus insured. The gigantic strides taken by this company will very soon place it far in advance of any railway corporation on this continent, in the extent of line controlled and vastness of corporate powers.

The eccentrics are 9 inches in size, and the motion of the valves is obtained by an arm keyed on the crank-pin and a double crank inserted in the end of the nrms. The steam-pipe is 5 inches in diameter, and the cylinders being on each side of the dome the pipe is branched and carried to the cylinders on the outside of the boiler with the throttle-valve in the dome. The frame consists of two parallel wrought-iron bers 4 inches in width and 1 inch thick, and 12 inches apart. The boiler is supported on this frame by wrought-iron brackete, to which it is riveted without adequate provision for expansion. There are 3 pairs of 22 inches double-plate trock-wheels. The truck is secured by a centreput attached to the shell of the boiler. The weight is about equally distributed upon the driving-wheels and trucks. The distance from the front end of the smoke-box to centre of truck its feet i inches, and from centre of truck to centre of driving-wheels 14 feet 6 inches. The driving-wheels are forest iron, with 20 spokes, 8 feet in siameter on a 7-inch axle.
