7%; Reading Railroad shares were dull at 21%; Pennsylvania Railroad shares firm at 46; Camden and Amboy
Railroad at 123, and Harrisburg Railroad at 53%. Little was done with fancy stocks, and bank stocks and passen-

The proper way to tax manufactures, it appears to us, if they must be taxed at all, is to make every manufacturer pay a percentage of Ax upon his grees cales, icaving it to him to apprtion the amount upon the articles of his production according to his own judgment and knowledge of their ability to bear the burden. This would not only simplify the assessment and collection of the tax, but would call to the aid of the Government all the articles knowledge of the manufacturers respecting the markets for their goods, their relative values, and the least objectionable mode of

pay such taxes.
