The Present Rebellion. REMARKABLE DOCUMENT, SHOWING THE SECRET The New York Times of Saturday contains the following document, which was sent to that paper by a correspondent, who found it in the fortifica tions at Fernandina, Florida, after they were taken possession of by our forces. The document gives us an insight into the secret history of the traitors during the month of January, 1861, and shows conclusively the wicked designs then entertained by the present leaders of the rebellion. It is from D. L. Tulee, then Senator from Florida, and is as fol-

lows:

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7, 1861.

MY DEAR Sir.: On the other side is a copy of resolutions adopted at a consultation of the Sonators from the Seceding States—in which Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas, Mississippi, and Florida were present.

The idea of the meeting was that the States should go out at once, and provide for the early organization of a Confederate Government, not later than 15th February. This time is allowed to enable Louisiana and Texas to participate. It seemed to be opinion [sie] that if we left here force, loan, and volunteer bills might be passed, which would put Mr. Lincoln in immediate condition for hostilities—whereas if [sic] by remaining in our places until the 4th of March, it is thought we can keep the hands of Mr. Buckanan tieth and disable the Republicans from effecting any legislation which will strengthen the hands of the incoming Administration.
