ADDRESS OF THE PORT ROYAL
RELIEF COMMITTEE.—The Permanent Committee, appointed by the public meeting held at National Hall, in this city, on the 3d inst., to consider the condition of the freed blacks within the lines of the Union forces in South Carolina, and elsewhere, have entered upon their duties, and now desfre to say a few words to the public on the subject entrusted to them.

The necessities of these people, and their claims unon our sympathy, are set forth by Gen. Sherman, the officer in command at Port Royal, in the following language:

"The helpless condition of the blacks inhabiting the vast area in the occupation of the forces in this command, cells for immediate action on the part of a highly favored and philanthropic people. The benevolent of the land are most estructively appealed to for assistence in relieving their immediate wants. There never was a nobler or more fitting opportunity for the exercise of that practical benevolence for which the Northern people have ever been distingui-hed."

Edward L. Pierce, the Government agent, resident at more fitting opportunity for the exercise of that practical benevolence for which the Northern people have ever been distingui-hed."

Edward I. Pierce, the Government agent, resident at Port Royal, in his report to the Secretary of the Treasury, dated February 3d, remarks as follows: "There are some material wants of this territory, requiring immediate attention. * * * * * On Port Royal Island, and that part of Ladies' near to it, destitution has commenced, and will, unless provision be made, become very great. * * * * On scarcely any (plantation) within this district is there enough (corn) to last beyond April whereas it is needed till August. On others it will last only two or three weeks, and on some it is entitled exhausted."

It ought also to be stated that many of the blacks are destitute of decent clothing; that having been always dependent upon their white masters for direction and organization in their labor, they require some tutelage to train them ito habits of sif-support, as well as to elevate their moral and social condition to a degree commensurate with their newlys acquired liberties.

It may be further added that there exists an immediate and pressing necessity for the protection of these unsophisticated people from the evils of contact with depraved whites. Paintul facts have come to our knowledge showing that the demand for safeguards against dangers from the source is shouldtely imperative.

howing that the demand for safeguards against danger from this source is absolutely imperative.

To accomplish these various ends we propose—
First. To supply the destitute among the blacks with clothing to the extent required by necessity and decency. Second. To send food sufficient to prevent suffering, until the Government can restore the supplies of grain and cattle taken off the plantations by the army on its first arrival, or otherwise provide for their sustanance until crops can be raised.

I hird. To furnish them with seed and implements, and organize their labor with a view to growing crops for their future support. uture support.

Fourth. To teach them the household duties and radi-nentary arts of civilized life, and finally to instruct them n the elements of an English education and the simple ruths of the Bible, divested, as much as possible, of all

These are purposes which need no argument to com-ment them. To the unrequited toil of these poor men and women we are indebted for many of our personal comforts and luxuries. Not to avail ourselves of this opportunity of discharging, in some measure, the obligation would argue great insensibility, if not derellction to obvious duty.

New York and Poston (with which cities we are in harmonious co-operation) have acted with creditable promptness in this matter, and it behooves us to see that Philadelphia shall not suffer by comparison. Our citizens have ever been noted for their ively interers in all well-considered efforts for the benefit of humanity, and this fact leas us to anticipate with confidence a generous response to the present appeal.
