After the adoption of the revised Constitution, which he helped to form, he was appointed Circuit Judge for the first judicial circuit, including this city, which office he continued to fill until he was disqualified by having attained the age of sixty years. Since the termination of his judicial labors, Judge Edwards has been many years in retirement, residing on Staten 1814.d. miding on Staten Island.
