The Great Victory near Corinth and its Receipt in Town. Pattle after bath, and mecess after success now reach us, over the wires, so that we do not exhibit the extreme elation or the extreme depression that used to mark the receipt of war intelligence. But yesterday victory ectured fresh again ; for, after great solicitude and long s'ruggled, vith the Union uppermost in the end, and the arcatest hope of the rebellion prostrate and despairing. About helf-past nine o clock, a despatch giving some particulars of the fight was received, and, upon being posted uren the bulletin boards of the newspaper offices soon drew tegether quite a crowd. Extras were issued from all the newspaper officer, and the boys found much difficulty in emplying the demand. The contents of these papers were eagerly devoured and passed rapidly from mouth to mouth, until the good news was spread almost overtle entire city within the space of an heur. Flags were disp'ayed in every quarter without any fear of their being injured by the disagreeable driggling rain which had been prevailing during the morning. Later advices, received direct from Pittaburg Landing and published in successive editions, confirmed the first reports relative to the number of killed and wounded, thus showing that the battle had been very severe, and that the ground had been hotly contested. The valor of the several officers engaged in the skirmish was variously discussed, and, as imagination tinted the several items of the telegraphic report, so rumor had a thousand tales of chivalry, cowardice, and hereism. The newsboys positively jammed Third street, many of them so excited that they could not effect a sale of papers, but contented themselves with screaming lustily. After dark the offices of the morning papers were surrounded, and the news was read to many went to bed unwillingly, and thought over the battle in their dreams. Great ignorance prevails as to the law on the subject of bounty and penien. Soldiers who have served for a few weeks, and have been discharged for one cause or another, imagine that the vean sell their discharges. This is a mistake. The bounty of \$100 is only payable to thase who serve for the war. If a soldier be killed in battle, his widow or heirs are entitled to the bounty and to the pay then due him. If a soldier be wounded and discharged for disability, he is entitled to a pension, according to the degree of disability, but in no case can a soldier sell his discharge.
