250, making an aggregate of 492-the former being in charge of a superiotendent, assistant superintendent, and 32 teachers, and the latter by  $\blacktriangle$  superintendent, (Mr. A. M. Spangler,) and a lady assistant. Five of the Children have died during the year, and twenty-four have been transferred from the Infant to the Main school. The number of the latter, it was said, would have been larger, but for the want of teachers. Allusion was also made by Mr. Moore to the peculiar circumstances of their present anniversary, as coustituting an appropriate part of the reception Bervices extended to their new pastor. After the reading of the report another hymn was sung by the Main School, entitled "Infant Home," which was followed with an ADDRESS BY BEV. MB. TALMAGE.

In the difficult field of addressing children effectively, this initial effort of Mr Talmage, in Philadelphia, gave evidence of decided Sunday-school talent. His remarks were sufficiently simple for the comprehension of the youngest, while the lessons impressed were not lost upon the most instured.

The church then, he said, was beautiful with children and flowers. The former were to him always interesting as the latter were always beautiful, on all days and in all places. They were emblematic also of a great many gs, and he had thought while listening to the report just read, that as the flowers which he saw around him that were to accompany the "offerings," had been beau-tifully arra ged in bouquets by interested hands, so the Lord delighted to p'uck such little ones of earth, as the superintendent has spoken of in his report, and form them into beautiful bouquets, to adorn the mansions of heaven. Ile referred feelingly to his separation from his ormer school in the city of Syracuse two weeks ago. He had known all its members by name, and he hoped that it would not be long before he would be equally well acquainted with those around him now, all of whom he mvited to stop him in the street whenever they met him and tell him their names, in case he failed to recognize thems. He also related a number of anecdotes illustrative of the utility of the Sabbath-school work ; the importance of impressing lessons of benevolence early upon the minds (f children, and the encouragement which every teacher should feel in his labors. Their efforts, he said. were frequently productive of great results when least expected. At the close of the address there was a beautiful hymn, very sweetly sung by the children of the infant school, entitled "We'll stand for the right," concluding thus:

" The right it shall triamph o'er sea and o'er land, Upheld by our Father's omnipotent hand ; And the Flag of our Union forever shall be The terrer of traitors, the pride of the free." THE "OFFERINGS"

By the "offerings, n their substantial zense at least, are to be understood the contributions of the several classes or " bands," to the missionary cause during the past year. Accompanying each of these separate contributions, however, there was a beautiful bouquet, or basket of natural flowers, or some other fancy article, with a neat card containing the amount contributed, with some appropriate scriptural or poetic motto, and the names of the donors, and the individual for whom the article was intended. These "offerings" were brought up the aisles by the little representa tives appointed for that purpose, and handed to Mr. Bloore, the superintendent, who read the contents of the cards to the congregation

When the Main School was through with this part of the programme, the Infant School "Circles" presented their "offerings" in a similar way to the superintendent of that branch, Mr. A. M. Spangler. Some of the latter were very tasteful. Among the most beautiful of the arzicles sent up, was an elegant basket of artificial flowers inscribed, "To the Rev. Dr. Berg, from the Infant School of the Second Reformed Dutch Church." A p'easant way of remembering their late pastor.

in unexpected feature was here introduced in the shape of a Bible presentation, which was done on behalf the navents of the children in the Infant School, by the Rev. Dr. Fisher, to Mr. A. M. Spangler, as a token of their appreciation of his services as superintendent The presentation speech was made in excellent taste, and Ir. Spangler's remarks in receiving the beautiful glfs—a magnificently-bound volume—were equally appropriate. Following this ceremony there was another hymn ; a collection (designated by Mr. Talmage to be the climax of interest,) and a closing hymn, called "The Golden Shore; or, Home Beyond the Tide." The con-gregation were dismissed with a benediction pronounced by Mr. Talmage. We may state, in conclusion, that the ter is to be installed as pastor of this church on Thursday evening of the present week.
