THE CITY.

PETROLEUM.—The trade in Petroleum since its insuguration a few months ago, has assumed most mammoth dimensions. The produce at the wells, as every one knows, has become enormous; and shipments to Philadelphia by way of Pittsburg and the routes, have been exceedingly large. This immense supply, and excess of production over consumption, has, of course, caused a steady depreciation in its price, and the refined article, which before brought 65 to 70 cents, is now freely offered at from 25 to 30 cents. The crude article has also declined about twenty cents \ gallon. A sale of 3,000 barrels was made here a few days ago at about ten cents & gallan. As the package costs \$1.50, or five cents & gallan, and the cruda article is selling in Pittsburg for 5 cents, while the cost of transportation is 3% cents & gallon more, the intelligent calculator can rtain that there will be but little profit left for the producer or original shipper.

The total exportations of the article from the United

States this year have reached 2,400,000, valued at \$700. 000, of which full one-fourth has been sent from Philadelphia. The exports from this port in January were 254,505 gallone, in February 3,686 gallons, and in March 969,694 gallons. A small quantity of this went to the West Indier, and the remainder to London—two entire ship loads having left for the latter place. A single firm in this city, since the commencement of the trade, has despatched four ship loads to London, and sundry other transient lots, in all 13,509 barrels and 239 cases. The coastwise trade in the article has also grown at a corre sponding rapid rate. Messrs. Twells & Co., finding that the business had assumed such vast dimensions, placed a line of packets direct between this port and Boston, and sent 6,000 barrels during the last four weeks. If a cargo of this volatile matter should unfortunately take fire at sea, or at our wharves, we would have a conflagration in good earnest.

When lard oil first made its appearance, many years since, the savans of the trade prophesied that sperm and whale oil, in a short time, would be comparatively worthless. The felly of such a prediction is now apparent, as the manufacture and consumption of lard oil has become enormous; yet to-day crude and refined whale cil and winter sperm oil command a higher price than when the first land-oil lamp made its appearance.

A NEW ARMY HOSPITAL TO BE A NEW ARMY HOSPITAL TO BE BUILT IN WEST PHILADELPHIA.—A large hospital, capable of accommodating a thousand patients, is about to be erected in West Philadelphia, on the south side of Mill creek, between the Baltimore turnpike and Spruce street. The hospital will be presided over by Dr. Neill, and will be located on high ground. The sewerage of the place will be accomplished by a capacious culvert built both north at d south of the hospital, which, with a descent of over fifty feet toward Mill creek, will furnish a drier foundation than can generally be obtained in town. town.
