HISTORY OF CITY DIRECTORIES .- In connection with the appearance of the new City Direcsubsequent directories may not be out of place. We may remark that the seven leading cities of the Union may remark that the seven learning cities of the Union have published directories of the names and readences of citizens with all other matters pertaining to the business, smusement, administration, etc., of the city, for several years. These have not been regularly issued, intervals of a year, and even of two years' having elapsed in some of ayear, and even of two years' having elapsed in some of the cities, between the appearances of these videous fit of the cities, between the appearances of these videous red and deficient. The directory of Boston is simply a collection of business advertisements. Here we have a city guide as thorough and complete as it is possible to have. Philadelphia public indexes to the famies and pursuits of the citizens have been published with much regularity since the year 1793. The first year lo which a directory was produced was 1785, at which period the business was commenced with such earnestness that two distinct volumes were published, one being gotten up by Frencis White, and the other by an eccentric old gentiams named Captain John Macpherson. The rotume published by the latter was about as odd as its author was, and collectors of such literary relies now held an odd cony of White er Macpherson to be worth almost or

The first directories are scarcely more than primers in appearance, in comparison with the more modern times, and they bear about the same relation to them in respect to bulk, ac, as the Philadelphile of that day bore to the present wide-apread and populous city. The success of the earliest contribut one to Philadeliphia directory likerature does not seem to have been encouraging, jadging from the fact that six years were suffered to clapse befor they were followed by a successor. In 1791, Mr. Clement Biddle published a directory, and at the same time, had not been numbered at all. or, if unumbered it was done at randem, and each housekeeper stuck such combinations of figures upon his preperty as suited his humor or convenience. The numbering of Mr. Biddle continued in 1848 until the present excellent system of allotting one hundred for each square was devised by Mr. John McAllister, Jr., and established by City Councils. In 1792, no directory was published, but in 1793 and 1784 Mr. James Hardie brought out directories. In 1798 Edmund Hogan published a directory which was got upu 554 a chilous plan. The streets were given in regular order, and the names of residents were printed according to their locality, without regard to alphabetical order. There was also an index to the whole. The book furnishes a curious panorama of the names and business pursuits of the housekeepers of that time. The system would be catirety impracticable at present. Thomas Stevens published a directory in 1796. Cornolius W. Stafford supplied the city's wants in that r-spect from 1797 to 1801. James Robinson followed suit from 1892 to 1811. Jahn Adami Paxion published a directory in 1813, B. T. Kite in 1814. 1815 was missed, possibly in consequence of the war with England. THE RIGHTS OF BIGHWAYS -In a THE MIGHTS OF HIGHWAYS—In a case of assault and battery is volving the rights of public highways, recently tried, Jings Thompson makes the following clear and sensible statement upon the subject: The man who owns or occupies a house has a right to the use of half the street in front thereof, subject, however, to the restriction of the right of way. The owner has every other right to occupy and use the streat, that does not interfere with the right of way. But in this right it cannot be said that a carriage or a cart shall not stop on the street, or infront of his property; yet no one has a legal right to stop in front of any man's property, so as to interfere with the business or pleasure of the

so as to interfere with the business or pleasure of the If an oysterman or a drayman stop before a man's house or store, and interferes with the business, the owner or occupant has a right to move him away. This, however, does not interfere with an oysterman or other person, who have a right to use the street a reacondate length of time; but he should remove when requested to do, if he interferes with the business of the occupant. To take hold of a horse's head, to remove him from premises so occupied, is no cause for assault and battery; this alone would not intally the owner or driver of the horse in striking the mover, nor has the mover any right to commit an assault and battery upon the owner of the horse in order to remove the obstruction.

PHILADELPHIA IN THE SWAMPS.—Our townsmen sometimes turn up in odd places.
