COOPER-SHOP SOLDIER'S HOME OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA. This instit about being established by the gentlemen composing the committee of the Cooper-Shop Volunteer Refreshmen Saloon, which has already attained for itself a wide and well-known reputation, bids fair eventually to become au institution which will reflect credit on the city of Philadelphia and her patriotic people. The subject of establishing a soldier's home in which to provide a permanen abode for all persons disabled for life, during the present war, was agitated some months since, and the matter was o encouragingly received by numbers of most of our prominent and wealthy citizens as to make it evident that the new enterprise must meet with the highest suc-

A number of the most wealthy and influential have already promised it their liberal support, so that the affair is now no longer an experiment, but a matter of certainty. Several meetings have been held by the committee, among whom are some of the most intolligent and respectable of our citizens, and the matter has been throughly discussed in all its bearings. A charter for the new institution has been granted by the judges of the Court of Common Pleas, and at a meeting held on Tuesday evening, a temporary organization was effected, and the charter adopted. The concern is to be controlled by a board of managers, who will be elected on Tuesday night week, notice to that effect having been published. The charter is most liberal in its views, and has thus far rece ived the sanction of all received the sunction of all

The preamble states that whereas certain citizens of
the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania have associated
themselves together for the purposes hereinafter set
forth, and are desirous of obtaining and enjoying the
powers and immunities of a corporation or body politic
in law under the provisions of, and in conformity with
the several acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of
Pennsylvania, in such case made and provided, they do,

The constitution says that the association shall be known by the name of "The Cooper Shop Soldiers' Home, of the City of Philadelphia." to have perpetual succession, and the privileges and immunities incident under the law to corporations or bodies politic, and to take, hold, and enjoy all manner of goods, chattels, and estates, the yearly income of which shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars. The object of the association will be to secure a suit-able building in the city of Philadelable, in which to ance building in the city of Philadephia. In which is provide a temporary of befurthed thome for all porsons who, while in the service of the United States of Ameri-ca, either upon land or sea, shall become disabled from wounds or from sickness, so that they are shereby unable wounds or from sickness, so that they are thereby unable to perform the ordinary avocations of life; where such persons may be nursed and cared for during sickness, and provided with comforts and necessities during con-valescence. The funds and means necessary for this purpose are to be provided by voluntary contributions purpose are to be provided and charities.

The officers of the association will consist of a board to be about as hereinafter provided, who

of managers, to be chosen as hereinafter provided, who shall conduct the affairs of the corporation, and shall make by-laws for their own government not inconsisten with the Constitution and laws of the United States, or the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth of Penn The board of managers will be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, on the first Wednesd of in January in each and every year, between the hours of 8 and 10 P. M., and continue in office one year, or until others are chosen. The board shall consist of not fewer than eleven, nor more than twenty five members, as shall be determined by the society at its annual meetings. In case of a failure to elect managers on the day above named, an election will be held at such other time as may be fixed by the managers, fourteen days, public notice of the time and place being given in at least two daily newspapers.

The board of managers will, within one week after notice of their election, choose from among their own brdy, by ballor, a president, vice president, treasurer, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, and solition. The treasurer will give sufficient security, to be approved by the board, for the latitudy performance of his irust. The board will also have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the body by death or otherwise. Any person contributing the sum of fity dollars annually may become a manber of the association, and be entitled to a vote and vice in the management of its affairs. Small contributions will entitle a person to no other than an honorary or contributing membership. She did not see him cut, but after they left she discovered that her busband was dead. Mrs. Hemphill's recollections of the events of the day were very contused, and she admitted that she as well as her husband had been drinking. Other witnesses who saw James Phillips after leaving the house describe him as being covered with blood and his head was much cut. The wound on Hemphill was inflicted with a mall penknife, and the heart had been penetrated, causing instant death.

Both James and Walter were under the influence of liquor. The case was finally submitted to the jury, who retired, and in a short time rendered a verdict of "not guilty."
