OBSEQUIES OF GENERAL CHARLES F.

SMITH—The remains of the late Major General Chas.
F. Snith, which have been lying in state in Indepindence Hall since Saturday evening last, will be
conveyed to-day to their final restling places. Yesterday
morning, at seven of click, Company A. First Artillery,
P. H. G., Captain Chapman Biddle, relieved the Girard
Guards as the guard of honor. The members took their
position around the coffin, and stood with sabres drawn.
Tre Hall was thrown open to the public at initio o'clock,

line and to preserve order. Persons were admitted by
the door on Chestnut street, and after messing through
the Hall, made their exit by one of the windows on Independence Square. A large photograph of the deceased
was laid upon the top of the coffin. There was a continual stream of individuals through the Hall during the
entire day, the doors being closul at 6 P. M.

THE PROGRAMME. 1. The body, borne by eight policemen, to be taken through the southern main entrance of Independence Square to Walnut street, accompanied by the pall-bearers, followed by military and naval officers in two ranks, and escorted by Captain Biddle's company of artillery. 2. Received with military honors appropriate to the rath of the deceased. The body wil be taken to the right of the troops, where it will be deposited in the hearse. hearse.

If the pall-bearers prefer to march, they can do so as far as they please, when, on desiring to ride, they will enter their carriages, which will follow immediately in their rear.

3. The military and naval officers will also march in procession in rear of the body guard of the remains, either in column of sections or by fice, as the officer in charge shall determine. If they shall desire to accompany the cortege to Laurel Hill, they will enter carriages following in their rear, whonever they desire to do so.

do so.

4. The family of the deceased, the reverend clergy, and the various civil officers and public bodies invited by the committee, will take the carriages provided for them, which will be in resultiess in Fifth and Sixth streets, above Walnut street, in the order arranged by the Committee Committee. mittee of Councils.

5. When the hearse and carriages for the pall-bearers shall have passed Fifth street on the march, the carriages which have been standing on Fifth street with the lartest heads towards Walnut street, will file into the column heads towards Wainut street, will file into the column and continue in the procession after passing Sixth street, the carriages in that street, also with horses' heads towards Wainut street, will file into Wainut street, after the others just named.

6. The entire procession will proceed out Wainut street to Twelfth street, out Twelfth street to Spring Garden street, thence to Broad street, and thence to Girard avenue, as may be determined, where the troops will be listed and wheeled into line, and the body, its attendants, and the civil procession, will pass in front of them, receiving from the troops the proper military salute; after which the troops not required with the escort with be dismissed, and will return to their quarters.

7. The escort proper with the remains and the rost of the cortege will continue their march to Laurel Hill, and will camplete the ceremonies of the day.
