CITY ITEMS.

CONTINUATION OF DR. LEIDY'S LECTURES AT THE UNIVER ITY—The fifth lecture of the course, new in progress at the University of Fennsylvania, by Ur. Leidy, one of the professors of that institution, on the subject of General Natural History, Comparative Anamatical Conference of Comparative Compara Zemy, and Physiology, was delivered on Friday, at the menal hour, 1 20 P. M., before a large and attentive aucience. He has evicently commenced at the Alpha of his subject, and is bying a thorough foundation for a con prehensive superstructure. The origin of all plants and animals from organic cells, the peculiarities of the latter as found in the different orders of these respective branches, or kingdoms, and the discussion of the Protosecas, or lowest division of the Animal king lom, have in a great measure been the theme of these lectures Litherto. In his last feeture, as already stated, the approximate dividing line which marks the boundary between Animal and Vegetable king one was traced-on which Dr Leidy assumed the following divisions to be properly denomicated under the head of animals; the tebrata, Molluska, Articulata, Radinta. and Protozoa. The latter, or Protozons, being the first anitheme, and for convenience of study were subdivided into hylozoa, Phyzopoda, Porifera, and Ciliata.

His lecture on Tuesday was largery a recopitulation of

the points presented in the preceding one, with more copiors and minute explanations, however, with an evident view to gradually familiarize the student with the world around him as presented to the eye of Science through the agency of the microscope. His discussion of the Ciliata or Polygastric (man) - stumathed) was pur-Micularly full, and was illustrated by a large number of Deautiful diagrams, which Dr. Leidy has cimself prepared from observations made during tie last fifteen Years of his life, which have been, in a great measure, devoted to the field of discovery in this department of tience. With reference to these Ciliata, however, he demonstrated that the term "many stomached" is a misnomer, as in reality the small cavities in this species of animalcule, which some paturalists have mistaken for omache, have none of the characteristics of that organ. This was illustrated in the paramecium, a transparent cule, visible to the naked eye, which is about one Altieth part of an inch in I-ngth, and was exhibited in e diagram as it appears under the microscope, en-Sarged to a length of about twenty inches. With regard to several objects described by the lec-

funer, he said he did not insist upon their being included in the Animal Kingdom, although to his mind they were spost properly so denominated. It was true that in none of the classes under consideration was there found the presence of a nervous system. This, however, did not essarily prove the absence of animal life, any more Than did the absence of a stomach, as was found in the itution of a tape worm, for example. On the other hand, the presence of what might not improperly be called a stomach was found in some plants, as for in-stance the pitch-rplant, which the lecturer showed to the a natural fly trap, adding, that the depositing of flies and other insects within its sack or stomach, ac-celerated its growth.
