THE CITY MEETING OF COUNCILS

The Storage of Petroleum and Benzine in the City-Another Veto by the Major-The Mar-ket-street Railrond-The Boudinot Lands-The Enlargement of Fairmount Park-Col.

SELECT BRANCH. THEO. CUYLER, president, in the chair. Petitions, Communications, etc.

From Simpson and N-ill asking for the passage of an ordinance prohibiting the storage of henzine, petroleum, and other explosive articles in the huilt-up portions of the city, or where such destruction of croperty as decirred at Christian-street wharf on Tuesday night might be epeated.

Mr MEGARY presented several petitions, numerously igned, relative to the same matter.

[The recent fire at Christian-street wharf, where a vessel loaded with coal oil burned for fourteen continuous hours despite the efforts of the firemen to extinguish the flames, shows that the article is executingly dangerhas but recently been introduced into commerce, and immense quantities are brought to the city from the wells, for shipment to the East and to Europe. Until vessels can be obtained to convey it abroad, the oil is stored in various parts of the city, in any vacant building which can be rented at a cheap rate. The Mayor and Fire Marshal Blackburn are constantly receiving complaints months subject. upon the subject.

The petroleum is not only a dangerous commodity in case of fire, but at all times the stench arising from it is very annoying. In the crude state, the benzine arising from the oil, and mingling with the stanospheric air, forms a substance more explosive than guapowder. Au forms a substance more explosive than gropowder. As a substance more explosive than gropowder, as a substance may occur from many causes; such as a lighted lamp, a spark from a cigar, etc. Even the heated surface of a glass lamp is liable to ignite the gaseous matter, and when once ignited, there is but little possibility of checking the fice. Retore the oil is used in lamps it is refined by distillation, and the benzine is extracted; therefore, the refined article is not explosive; but should a fire occur where this oil is stored, there would be the same difficuly in extingui-hing the flames of ground on Fortieth street, which he refuses to approve.

Mr. Megary moved further to amend allowing the company to make all the necessary turnouts that may be remined, the same to meet with the approval of the Highway Department. Agreed to.

The ordinance, as anended, passed finally.

Mr. Fox. from the Committee on City Property, reported in favor of allowing further accommodations in the office of the prothonotary of the Court of Common Piess. An ordinance was appended appropriating the same of \$225 for the same; also, the for her rum of \$50, to pay for a flag recently purchased, which was adopted.

The Committee on Schools off-red an ordinance authorizing the rental of an additional schools use in the Fourteenth section, at not more than \$550, and to provide furniture for the same at a cost of not more than \$550. \$650.

This measure appears to he sunimently necessary in order to prevent the surface drainage from yards, horse stables, old dilapidated buildings, &c. emptying their accumulated fith and other deleterious matter in the forebay at the fost of Coates street, and there he immediately pumped into the basin and distributed through the city to be drank and cate n by our citizens. It appears that the Coate street and Landing avenue fronts of this triangular tract are occupied with two good hoters, a few telerably well-built dwellings, and the balance of the structures are a percel of cilapidated establishments, with uncovered land in the rear of these fronts. If this ordinance passes, it will afford the weastion of the whole of Coates street, west of the Reading Railroad, down to the river Schuplkill, and will convert this street and the property in question, as provided in the bill, into beautiful carriage drives and grassy lawns, as one continuous park; making, when fioished, one of the most beautiful and spacions places of resect in this country, and at the property are constituted by a correct wearened union to the property in question.
