the house were his wife, Mary Cherdron, and six chil Yesterday morning, Cherdron, while engaged at work at home, went anddenly out to procure some cotton. In a short time he returned and came into the kitchen with his hands folded bebird him. He asked his wife to come into the frent recent. Sinc followed him, when he raised a six barreled Alien revolver and shot one load at his wife. The weapon was founded with a bail which entered her stemach, producing a mortal wound. She immediately commenced woulding blood, and made her way through the result part of the house to the residence of a neighbor, where she fell exhausted. She was picked up, placed on a settee, and Pr. Lindsay was summoned to her sid. He pronounced her highresmorted, the homerhage being internal. The unfortunate woman remained conscious of her situation, and desired the presence of a confessor. A German pricad was seen for, who administered to her the offices for the dying.
