

Having fully discussed the fifth, or doubtful, division of the Animal Kingdom, in his previous lectures at the University, in his present interesting course of scientific lectures on General Natural History, Dr. Leidy, yesterday, took up the fourth division, technically denominated the Radiata, a name applied to this division on account of the radiating form peculiar to most of the individual animals embraced in it, of which the star-fish furnishes a good example. The division of Radiata was divided, by the lecturer, juto two classes—*Azalepha* and *Echinodermata*, which in turn were subdivided into minor branches, or orders. Under the former, or Acalepha, (a Greek wor!, signifying a nettle,) the three blowing orders were in loded ; First, the Coralliferi ; second, the Actinic, and third, the Hydroids and Madu-sc, the last two named being embraced under one head from the fact of their mutual reproduction of each other. These, the lecturer said, had the property of stinging, and paralyzing their grey. His discription of the Poly-pus, or, as the term implies, many-footed tribe, Was exceedingly interesting, wincing a wonderful familiarity with the theme in all its minutim. The polyp, he said, was found in all parts of the world. Of those discovered in our own fresh waters, there were two varieties, the black and the brown, and in order to illustrate their structure and characteristics to the eye as well as to the ear, Dr. Leidy exhibited, in large diagrams, beautifully ored, a number of these polyps taken from a pond in Fairmount Park, as they appear enlarged under the

The lecturer's descriptive dissertation upon the Corallifera, or corsl instate, was probounced by scientific tlemen in attendance to be the most satisfactory delineation of this division of his subject that they had ever enjoyed. The skeletous of these coral formations were exhibited in great variety, some of them being fanhaped, others spherical, some plant-like, looking not unlike the grouped amlers of a deer. on a small scale, and some bore a striking resemblance to the convoluted an brain, as it appears uncovered beneath the skull The substance composing them bore more resemblance to horn than woody fibre. The description of the process of growth and reproduction, which characterizes the sorallifera was also interesting, and showed that their internal structure, no lass than their outward form, places hem in the radiating division of the animal kingdom. The coral reefs, of which there popularly existed a y erroneous impression, were not, he said, the result of the coral insect founding a mountain at the bottom of the ocean and carrying it upwards in one homogeneous mass. The nucleus was usually formed on rocks, to which other individual meases was, from time to tim added ; but neither of which was ever found to be of very large size. The description by the lecturer of the production of the red consl of commerce was listened to with peculiar interest, especially by the ladies, who, we may state, en passant, form a larger proportion of the au ience at these lectures. from week to week.
