THE SITE OF THE NEW POST OFFICE. Worken are now busily ongaged in the old Government buildings in Obestnut street, below Fifth, which are designed for the new post effice. Those buildings, and the ground on which they are erected, are not without interest. In 1783, the fine buildings which still stand there were orected. The structures were originally put up for dwellings. The building nearest to Fourth street was built by Dr. Adam Kuhn, a worthy physician of the old whool, and the father of the late Mr. Hartman Kuhn. In the year 1830, the property was sold to the library Company, and by them it was altered into a store, which was first occupied for business purposes by Doggett, Farnsworth, & Co., as a carpet and hooking-glass store. About the year 1834 life. Lyou J. Lery obtained pess; ssin of the ureniess, and from that period cown to 1858 he and his narthers conducted the inshionable day goods establishment of the city upon the spot.

In 1836 the property was bounds from the Philadelphia Library Company, by the Bank of the United States. In 1841 the trustees of the last named institution sold it to the Mechanics' Bank. Mr. Lovy bought it from the latter in 1842, and he subsequently rold the property to the United States for the purpose to which it is now about

The lot on the west, which is included in the post office improvement, was purchased from the Norris heirs, by Mr. William Williams, in 1749. The property was subsequently owned in turn by Mr. Samuel Mickle Fox, Mr. Robert Coleman, Mrs. Jodge Hemphill, and finally by Mr. Joseph T. Bailey, of the firm of Bailey & Kitchen, who sold it to the Government.

From 1858 to 18c1, the buildings were uncoupled, after which they were given over to Yan Amburgh as a after which they were given over to Yan Amburgh as a menagerie. Subsequently, when the rebellion broke out, it was made a recruiting station, and a number of regiments were recruited there. Since the close of fast year the buildings have been used as attrehouses by the Government.

THE STORAGE OF COAL OIL. - Nume

THE STORAGE OF COAL OIL.—Nume rous petitions and remonstrances have been presented to Councils lately, against the storage of coal oil in the built-up portions of the city. It has been fully proven that some of this oil is highly inflammable, and even in cool weather needs handling with precaution against coming in contact with flame unprotected. Even the best prepared article cannot, it is said, be long kept in a temperature of 100 deg. Fah enhelt, or even 95 deg., without considerable danger of an explosion from the gas roolved, if a light be brought near. Now that the warm weather is upon us, new regulations should be at once made in regard to the storage and shipment of the pertoleum, both crude and refined. The present method of chivering large quantities of this oil 12 barrels, upon whaves accessible to all persons, is loudly complained of. It is proposed that the proper authorities should set apart of oil should be made, and that in summer the article should not be allowed to tensia exposed on the warres, to either the heat or to wanton mischief, but be kept in well-aired buildings or covered sheds, which might be within enclosed wharves like private property. If all casts containing oad oil were white-washed; if ressels leading were always, in warm weather, protected from stem to stern with awnings, there would be comparatively but little danger from the heat of the weather. The sheds under which the oil should be stored might extend even to the end of the piere, which, would be an additional protection while loading the vessels.
