Mr. Kelley. I thank the gentleman most exceedy for having yielded the floor, for it seems to me that the remarks of the gentleman from Indiana (Mr. Voorthes) aroutes investigated. He says we live in strange. for having rielded the floor, for it seems to me that the remarks of the gentleman from Indiana (Mr. Voorhees) require immediate rejeinder. He says we live in strange times; and in so far. I sares with him. It seemed to nie, as I listenct to him, that I had been unconsciously transported; that I could not be in the hall of the American House of Representatives, or that the gentleman had mitaken his forum; for I am quite sure that if the speech which he made had been utiored in the hall of the Confederate Congress, its well-rounded periods would have drawn down cuthusia tic plaudits. The corruptions of the Administration of Abraham Liucoln, says he, are teadding the labor of the country with a burden which it cannot bear, and which will destroy the value of the property of the people. Nir, was John B. Floyd a member of Abraham Lincoln's Cabited? It was he who stole the arms that stocked the arsenals of the country, and gave them into the hands of the rebels to wage this war. Was Howell Cobb a member of Abraham Lincoln's Cabited? It was he, sir, who brought the credit of the Government so low that at twelve per cent. per annum we could not borrow, in our own markets, the half of a proposed loan of \$5,000,000, and caused Europe t) turn up her nose—so to speak—at the bare suggestion of the loica of value in American securi-ics and American credit. Was Jacob Thompson a member of Abraham Lincoln's Cabinet? Yet it was he who diemanted the only two ships that he had permitted to remain in our waters, and who sent all other national results good the reach of the voice of the President of the United States, or any of bis ministers. The trachery of Floyd and Toncey created the exigency which forced the Government into the hands of speculators in vessels and arms. Were, I ask, those thieves and acoundrels members of the present Administration, or of that over the overthrow of which

Administration, or of that over the overthrow of which the gentleman mourns? I have heard of Satan reproving and of dark things calling each other black; but I er have witnessed so gigantic an illustration of either Mr. VOORHEES. Whenever the gentleman from Penn mr. Kelley. Mr. Kelley. I am opposed, Mr. Speaker, to swindling, either in fact or in thought, to stenling property, or to fraudulently deluding people from their particities and their bonest convictions. I believe in honesty and or to transitionally deliming people from their patriotism and their konest convictions. I believe in honesty and veracity, and I say that the present condition of the country is the natural result of the training which its people received at the hands of the Democratic party. It held the power, honors, and patronage of the Government for rearly sixty years. It made our country the plunderer of nations, provided they were feeble. Fill-buster become synonymous with Democrat during the last two Administrations. There was no principle of honesty or veracity which the Democratic party, as represented by the Administrations of Franklin Pierce and James Buchanan, illustrated to the people of the country. And if the management of the war be corrupt and expensive, I pray you to bear in mind, as the country will, that Abraham Lincoln found trained pupils and proteges of those Administrations is all the Departments and bureaus. Those Administrations had schooled armies of contractors into corrupt ways, which they preactised on old office-holders with whom they were familiar, or their inexperienced successors, and it does not lie in the mouth of an adherent of those Administrations—of one who seeks to resuscitate the party who sustained them—to rebuke the Republican party or Abraham Lincoln on these joints, or even to suggest to them that greater honesty and sounder discretion should provail in the Affairs of the Government. Can you tell me, sir, or will anylody who reads the remarks of the gentleman be able to say, whether he disapproves of the rebellion? whether he wishes us to make inglorious peace to-day, and toossibly to stitulate to say the axyenses of the rebellion? whether he wishes us to make inglorious peace to-day, and possibly to stipulate to pay the extremest of the rebels during the war, provided they promise us peace in the future? What are his views ou the subject? Did Abraham Liscoin fire on Fort Sumptor? Did the Republican patty steal the forts, and arsenals, and mints in the Son h? What did they do to bring on this war? They only asked that the Government might be administed as Washington and Jefferson. Virginians and slaveholdors, schministered it. That is what they desired and proposed to do when they came into power. And shall those who encouraged the rebols to strike, and who have had no word of condemnation for them, even up to to-day, say that the Republican party is responsible for the cost of the war, or the grievous burden of taxation it will impose on the wealth and labor of the gentleman unless there is some rule or order which entitles him to the floor.

Mr. Kelley. Look at the credit of the country. Let us see what the world says—what it thinks of the honesty and fatraises of the present Administration. A little more than a year ago Abreham Lincola became President of the United States. On the 4th day of July last the American Congress assembled to receive his first message. Your treasury was bankrupt, your paper was hawked on the streets at 12 per cent. per annum interest, and could be sold in but small parcels, and below par, at that rate. Your bonds were coming howe, to be sold at any sacrifice, from every land where people had invested in your credit. Your own people lacked confidence, and shrunk from investing in any Government loans. But when it became apparent that the Democratic party was dead beyond resurrection, that honesty of purpose, patriotism, and wisdem had taken possession of the reins of Government, confidence returned. Our capitalists have thrice tendered the Administration mouse in sums of \$50,000,000 at an offer, and the bankers of London and the continent are repurchasing at a prantum on par the bonds they gladly sold at any sacrifice but a little year ago.

The gentleman seems to sigh for the restoration of the Democratic party. Sir, I caunot hear the aspiration uttered without thinking of a secue the traveller among the Swiss mountains bels ids. As you account the Right side to catch a view of the glowing sunset from the Knlm, you come across a broad space, stretching away as far as the eye can reach, apparently for leagues, upon the broken and barren surface of which no weed or grass takes root. Your guide or guide-book tells you that there, near the base of that desolate scene, once stood the happy and thriving village of Goldau, with its churches, its maneious, its hamlets. When the landslide took place, and the earth, a full hundred feet doep, over all that space was loosed from its bed and went thundering into the valley, it bur sye or man will never benoit the ruins of Goldan. For it there is no resuscitation. But, sir, until that buried village shall again welcome the rising sun, the Democratic perty, as we have known it, can never exist. Goldan wrought not its own ruin; but the Democratic party, under its recent leaders, wrought a land-slide upon the mountain of time and civilization which the traveller in all ages will mark with horror, and buried itself under a mass of ruins so deep, so grand, so awful, that no measure of energy or onteroriss can revivalt. fathers owned, and from the hemes of their birth, would leave no country and no party to the people of this country should they be victorious. We must be on one side or the other now. There must be victory to the robels or victory to the Government. We have been forced to a trial of arms, and the great question can only be decided by, to borrow a figure from the gentleman, one side baying their necks under the beels of the other. He tells us he does not want to see the necks of the robels brought under our heel. I tell him that the loyal people of the country will not put their necks under the heels of the other. He rebels, and, therefore, it must be fought out, and fought to the bitter end, which end must, if need be, if so the rebels choose, result in holding a subjugated people under the rule of those whose Constitution is the supreme law of the land the rebels occupy.

THE EXCITEMENT IN BALTIMORE.

The Baltimore papers, yesterday, coatain accounts of the excitement which prevailed in that city on Sunday. The Maryland News Sheet, a Secession organ, states #The news of the defeat of the regiment of Col. Keuly exasperated the Union sentiment of the city, and yestorday morning it was very evident that the slightest cause would incide a riot. About helf past 10 o'clock a gentleman named Freeman was on the corner of Baltimore and South streets, near the Sun Bullding, and he used some remark which was distasteful to a party near him, and he was immediately assaulted. The moment the fight commenced, the crowd, several hundred in number, which had congregated in front of the American and Clipper offices, ran to the scene, shouling for the Union, and inciding the crowd rossed upon the parties, and for a time a general riot was threatened. This fight was the beginning of a series which kept the city in a perfect tunuit during the entire day. It was only necessary to point out a man as one of Southern sympathy when the crowd would immediately attack him, kneck him down, and stamp upon him when he was on the ground. The police force was increased, but it was utterly impossible to control the violence of men who acted without fear and without responsibility. One after another, citizens were beaten, who had not given the least provocation. The police took charge of the assaulted part es, and conveyed them to the station-house, when a number of them were arrested by order of the Marshal of Police."

The Baltimore Sun, Union; states that "a large collection of persons assembled on Baltimore served, with made and a large onlection of persons assembled on Baltimore served, was led from the crowd by choose, which is face covered with bload. He was taken to the central police station, when it appeared in testing the relation of the corner of Baltimore sund station, when it appeared in testing the made use of expressions calculated to excite a riot, and the police had considerable difficulty in extricating him safely from the crowd. That seemed only necessary to raise the excitoment to the highest pitch, and for more times two hours there were frequent assaults.

"A number of persons shortly after went to a house on the corner of Baltimore and Harrison streets, on one of the upper floors of which are rooms occupied by a quadrille association, a portion of the furniture in which was broken. There were several of the members in the

room at the time, who jumped from the second story on Baltimore street. Quite a number of persons were as-saulted, but in the centre of the city there was no sections damage. The police were out in trong force, and were instrumental in preventing the commission of greater damage. 'About noon, the crowd left the centre of the city and went westward, the late scene of excitement being then comparatively quiet. In the afternoon, the throng again gathered on Battimore street, near South, and there was promise of further trouble when Mr. Sammel Hindes, one of the police commissioners, made his apparance and soon restored order. About five o'clock, when a rush was made, Mr. H. threw himself before the crowd and commanded it to halt. His presence commanded respect, when he made a short address. He told them that they were making the excitement. If they were Union men, they were in favor of 'the Union, the Coastitution, and the enforcement of the laws.' The police were the conservators of the peace, and as such they were bound to preserve the reces and anforce the laws at any and every hazard. His words had the desired effect, ard soon the throng begen to disperse and continued until order was rectored. A strong body of police was stationed at the corner of North and Baltimore streets for the remainder of the day, but no further demonstration of disorder was made. Throughout the whole affray, the police labored zealously for the premotion of the peace, and promptly afforced protection to those who were assalled."
