Mr. MEGARY, from the Committee on Water, reported a resolution in favor of laying water pipe in Haverford road, Twenty-fourth ward, and Hare street, between Twenty fourth and Twenty-fifth, in the Fifteenth ward. Agreed to.

Agreeo to. A resolution was also offered, directing the Chief En-gineer of the Water Works to supply the Kensington district with water from the Schuylkill, instead of Dela-

ware water. Mr CBAIG wished to know whether this wou'd be ex-Mr GRAG wished to know whether this word he ex-pedient. He also wanted to know whether it would not leave some districts with a scarcity of water. Mr. Fox strongly favored the proposition. Mr. MEGARY, from the committee to whom were re-Mr. MEGARY, from the committee to whom were re-ferred reveral petitions and communications relative to the impurity of the Kensington water, reported that they had carefully examined the subject-matter em-braced in said petitions; they had also been waited upon by a committee of cluizens from that district, who feel-ingly sppealed to them as members of Oouncils to slid them in obstinuing a supply of pure and healthy water. From the statement of these gentlemen, it is evident that about 110,000, or one sixth of the inhabitants of this city are all more or less flooted and suffering from the deleterious effects of the water now furnished to them Tonder these circumstances, the committee feel it to be their duty to recommend some means for the alleriation

their duty to recommend some means for the alleviation of this portion (f our citizeus. Having carefully censi-

of this portion (f our ottizeus. Having carefully censi-dered like matter, your committee recommend that the obief engineer be inst ucted to turn off the water from the Kensington basics and connect the mains now sup-plying that district with the mains from the Schuylkill works. This will affore temporary relief. For the purpose of giving a permanent supply of Schuylkill water to this district; and at the same time giving a better supply to the citizens of the Sifteenth and Twentieth wards, your committee are of the opinion that it will be necessary to lar a forty-inch main in Columbin avenue on Masier street, from Spring Garden Beservoir to Tenth street, which, with the necessary connections to zervice pipes, stops, branches, &c., it is estimated will cost 31(9,350. The total expense of the whole work will be \$400,000.

A Loan Bill of \$400,000 Reported.

The report was accompanied with the following reso Resolved, by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia, That the Coumittee on Finance he, and they are horeby, directed to prepare and report an ordinance creating a loan of four hundred thousand

he, and they are horeby, directed to prepare and report an ordinance creating a loan of four hundred thousand dollars, for the purcoso of giving a better supply of water to the citizens of the Fiftsenth and Twentieth wards, and for supplying the district now supplied from the Delaware works with Schuylkill water. Mr. WEFIRERIL thought that the sum was too small for this great work. He was opposed to the passage of the resolution, nules: assured that the sum was sufficient without asking for additional apprepriations. Mr. MEGARY explain d the manner in which it was proposed to to done, and thought the sum was sufficient. Mr. Fox said that ne calamity was so great as to deprive a community of water, hence the immediate passage of the resolution. He was in favor of the loan for \$400,000. What we aim at is to connect all these works and afford agod supply of water to all parts of the city.

The committee on resolutions for a State organization reported through the chairman that there are 692,000 children in the State, between the ages of five and fitteen years, and of these there are 300,000 who have no con-nection with Sunday schools, and 90,000 chanot read or write. It is recommended that argont measures be taken to remedy this state of affeirs, and it is thought that the establishment of a State agency would be of great good in bringing the children to the Sunday school. In conclusion, the committee presented the following prenuble and resolutions. BilWhereas, It is mailfest to this committee that nearly one-half of the children and youth of this State of suit-able age have no connection with any Subbath school; and whereas this evil will never be effectually remedied without the most vigorous, united, and asystematic effort of the friends of Subbath schools: therefore, *Resolved*. That we apoint an executive committee, the trans of the transity of whom shall be from the conties of the State, a majolty of whom shall con-stinute a quorum, with power to appint from their own number a Siste trassure and secretary, to fill varancies that may occur in their own body and in the öffice of county secretaries, to call State conventions, and to have a general supervision of the Subbat school in therest

that may occur in their own body and in the öffice of county secretaries, to call State conventious, and to have a general supervision of the Sabbath-school interest within the limits of the State. *Resolved*, That we appoint one county secretary from each county of the State, whose duty it shall be to survey the Sunday-school aspects of the county, call conven-tions, and aid in the organization of a Sabbath school in overy public-school district where needed a.d practica-ble, and shall co-operate with and under the sanction of the executive committee.

A motion was made to refor the report to the committee on resolutions. A role was taken, wire note, but the re-solutions were declared tabled by the chair. The following was offered by Mr. Spangler as a substi-tute for the report tabled. *Resolved*, That this Convention most carnestly recom-mends the immediate formation of Sabbath-school asso-ciations in every county in the State, and that so soon as such associations shall be formed vigoroms ateps shall be taken to secure reliable statistics in regard to the Sabbath-school interest in the respective counties, to be presented at the next State Convention. Without coming to any conclusion on the subject, the Convention adjourned at six o'clock until half past seven o'clock.
