The Home Guard Overconts. A communication was received from the Mayor, stating at the Committee on Defence, on the 17th of last Feb ruary, delegated to a sub-committee the purchase of 2,000 uniform overcoats from the Federal authorities for the use of the Home Guard, with special reference to the the use of the Home Guard, with special reference to the review and inspection of that organization by the Governor of the State on the 22d of that month, and subsequently an additional purchase of 500 was sanctioned by the committee. This resolution was adopted, and such action had, wholly without the consent or knowledge of the Mayor, who was not advised thereof until the overcoaterhad been received and distributed; and he has refused to draw warrants for expanditures thus incurred, as he decum without due authority, under existing circumstances. matances. The ordinance of April 26, 1861, in view of the then The ordinance of April 26, 1861, in view of the then exigency in public afteris which demanded promptness and efficiency of action, unthorized and empowered the Mayor, in conjunction with the joint special committee of Select and Common Councils, to cause such measures to be taken for the safety, protection, and defence of the city of Philadelphia as the deemed requisite, and such power and authority in that behalf as it was computent, under existing laws, for the city of Philadelphia to exercise, was there by conferred upon the Mayor, acting in conjunction with and under the advice of the joint special committee a forestid. ommittee aforesaid.

The phraseology of this ordinance, which entrusts special authority and power in the first place to the Mayor and committee in conjunction, and subsequently devolves the same upon the Mayor, acting in conjunction with and under the advice of the committee, is by no means explicit, but interpreted in connection with the provision of the act of consolidation, which probibits members of Councils, whether as a committee or otherprovision of the act of consolidation, which prohibits members of Councils, whether as a committee or otherwise, from performing any executive duty whatever, no question can be raised as to its legal import.

The special committee of Councils, Jointly with the Mayor, were entrusted with the duty of ascertaining the measures requisite to be taken for the safety and defecce of the city, and the Mayor was empowered to execute those measures; hence the advice of the committee and the action of the Mayor in accordance therewith are both essential to the fuldiment of the terms of this ordinance. The exigency under which the ordinance was adopted by Counci's hal passed away before the contemplated purchase of these overcoats; and, however essential they may be to the equipment of the Home Gard, such promptness of action on the part of the committee was hardly needed for the defence of the city at that time.

THE LATE HOMICIDE CASE AT SCHUYLKILL HEIGHTS.—CORONER'S INQUEST. -Coroner Conrad commenced an inquest yesterday morning, at his office, South Fourth street, in the case of the murder of Mr. Richard M. Berry, at Egglesfield, on Thursday of last week. The three prisoners who were arrested last week were

Dr. Silas Updegrove testified as follows: I made a post-

mortem examination of the deceased, and an examina-tion of the heart, lungs, stomach, bowels, and kidneys was made, without revealing any evidences of injury or tion of the heart, lungs, stomach, bowels, and kidneys was made, without revoaling any evidences of injury or cause of death. He next examined the brain, when it was found that an effusion of blood had taken place at the posterior portion of the base of the each brum; also, a large serious effusion over a portion of the surface of the cerebellum, beneath the arachmoid. These effusions caused compression of the brain and death.

In reply to questions by District Attorney Mann, Dr. U. saic death was caused by compression of the brain; this might have been caused by a blow or by concussion. In a May was sworn and testified that she resuled in Philemon place; she was on the hill near Egglesheld, and saw the beginning of the affair; hor friend, Chury Kiehl, was shoved down the hill and had her face cut; a gentleman (Mr. Berry) stopped up and said it was ungentleman (Mr. Berry) stopped up and said it was ungentlemanly conduct; a man stopped up and said, "Do you take it up for her?" Mr. Borry then ran up the hill, and several men ran after and beat him; to save him I screamed murder and said he was my husband.

The prisoners were confronted with the witness. She thought she had seen Lawrenes on the ground, but she did not recognize Furter or Jeffries

Mary Kiehl sworn.—I reside at the northwest corner of St. John and Green streets; a man came up and pushed na down the hill; my friend wined the blood of my mary Aight sworn.—I resude at the northwest corner of St. John and Green streets; a man came up and pushed me down the hill; my friend wiped the blood off my stoc; I next saw several men kicking Mr. Berrs; I did not see how the fight began; I cannot recognize Law-rence as being present; I would be able to swear to the man who knocked me down, if I saw him; I saw Jeffeies man who knocked me dowp, it I saw him; I saw Jeffries and Furter on the hill; I think Furter was the man who kicked Mr. Berry last.

Mary Ann Steinmotz sworp.—I live at 1334 Mascher strett. The witness stated in substa. ce that she was at Schuylkill Heights, and was invoked by a sick woman to set her saws assistance. Schuylkill Beights, and was invoked by a sick woman to get her some assistance; she went for help and on her return she saw a party of men abusing her; the same men afterwards put another woman in a wagon and treated her scandalously; she then saw the meu pushing a woman down the hill, the interference of Mr. Berry, and the beating of the latter.

Lawrence, the witness said, is the man who put the woman in the wagon, and held her with her clothes above her waist, and also insuited our party. He also ran through Egglesfield after the beating. She saw Furter and Jeffres on the ground; but did not know whether they struck an) body.

Harrier Heyer, who lives at 1334 Mascher street, was sworn. It was this witness who was with the sick woman at Schuylkill Heights. She testided to being insulted by the party of men; the same party put a woman in a wagou, and pushed the witness and others do on the hill. Lawrence insulted the witness in the ball-room at Schuylkill Heights, and put the woman in the wagon; but he protested against pushing the women down the hill. Furter was present at the time. She saw none of the fighting.

Robert Maguire sworn.—He was on his way home

Robert Maguire sworn.—He was on his way home from Schnylkill Heights and saw the fight; he heard Minnie Forepaugh threaten to attack a person, and Goo. Forepaugh struck him; the sams men and furter were in the crowd who afterwards attacked Berry; the ruffishen attacked Mr. Moore and beat him; the man whom he took for Furter had en Indian ink mark on his right Furter was ordered to bare his arms; he did so, and the mark described was found there. The witness fully identified Furter as being engaged in the attack on

the malk described was found there. The witness fully identified Furter as being engaged in the attack on Berry.

Witness resumed.—Tinsman was engaged in beating Berry; Jeffries was engaged in the attack on Moore; witness did not see Lawrence in the fight.

George W. Young sworn.—Furter told him the day after the murder that George Forepaugh hadkilled Berry; he had struck him twice upon the head.

John Tinsman affirmed.—The witness is the father of one of the persons accused. Furter had declared to witness the next morning that young Tinsman did not strike. Berry at all is struck another man and pushed a woman; he said-teorge Forepaugh had struck herry. Witness had not seen his son since yesterday a week.

Charles Forepaugh was sworn and stated that Furter had boasted to him, the evening of the occurrence, stat he had struck Derry and knocked him down; he said the — never moved after he struck him.

Charles Tomlinson was sworn and corroborated the cyidence of Charles Forepaugh; he was present when Furter said he had "fatched" Berry.

Thomas Hay tworn.—He was present at the time referred to by the last two witnesses; Furter had said he had been in the fight; he said he knocked them andown; the lister fe 1 backwards sad quivered; George Forepaugh and Lawrence afterwards came along, and Furter west away with him; Furter next morning said to him that if Berry was killed it was George Forepaugh who killed him.

Branson sworn.—This witness saw Lawrence pick up the woman and put her in the wagon; he then saw the quarrel with the women, and the knocking down of the men who first interfered for their protection; he saw the parties engaged in the fight, but he was most singularly oblivious as to who struck the hows; although he evidently knew all the accused well, he could recognize no one that struck a blow.

Frank Bockins sworn.—He was with Mr. Serry at tha time the affair commenced; he saw Dickson beaten; he got the latter away; he saw nothing of the attack on Bry. he got the fatter away; ne saw nothing of the attuck on Birry.

Robert Berkman sworn.—This witness was in advance of Berry, on the road home; he had seen the abuse of the woman, and he uttered a pretest against it; he was knocked down and beaten after selling Mr. Berry about the circumstance; he saw nothing of the attack on the latter; witness could not recognize either of the risoners.

THE WOUNDED AT ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL.—The sick and wounded soldiers recently sont to
St. Joseph's Hospital, of this city, are all contained in the
Lew wing of the building, the cornor stone of which was
laid on the 19th of July, 1800, by Right Rev. Bishop
Wood. It is admirably fitted up, and is in every way
adapted for a model hospital. A steam engine located in
the basement is kept almost constantly in motion, to supriy water to the many different wards. The basement is
divided into convenient apartments, and at its eastern end
is a little bijon of a chapel for the use of the community,
and for such of the patients as are inclined to enter it.
Directly opposite, across, the entrance hall, is the medical library of the institution. The staid, ponderous
old volumes cover two sides of the room, and number about four hundred and fifty. It is at present
occupied by the surgeous who are in attendance
unen the wounded soldiers. The remainder of the rooms
on this floor are devoted to the domestic operations of the
house, culinstry, &c. Overhead, and occupying all the
stories of the buildings, are the wards for the patients.
These are at present filled to repletion, one hundred and
eighty soldiers being accommodated. So pressed have
the Sixters been that the cells intended for insane patients have lost their gratings and their insignia of close
cutody, and are now perferming the same duty as the
r st of the wards. And the corridors, too, are occupied.
Many little couches are placed here and there on the
landings, and on them such of the patients as desire, and
allowed by their physicians to use them, have comfortabiy setfied themselves. There are not many cases in
which death is likely to occur. Nearly, if not all, the
men have been wounded in the arms and legs, and but
few so sericusly as to require amputation. There have
been several fever cases, but the sufferers are rapidly improving. All seem perfectly satisfied with the treatment
they received from their unassuming, self-denying nurses.

THE NEW U. S. HOSPITAL IN THE

TWBNTY-FOURTH WALD.—The new United States Government hospital, now beirg constructed in the Twenty-fourth ward, under the direction of Quartermaster Orosema, for the accommodation of sick and wounded soldiers, promises, when completed, to be the finest structure of the kind in the whole country. The building is leated on a lot on Forty-fourth street, between Sprace street and the Beltimore turnpike, and is being build on the pavilion plan, which was tried with great success during the Orimean war. On the centre of the lot is located the medical department, which is 63 feet in width by 71 feet. In length, and will be divided into different rooms necessary for the medical staff. It will connect at each end with a large and commodious dising hall, each 14 feet in width and 625 feet long. On each side of the dining hall are the different wards, twenty in ell, for the patients. These wards are 24 feet by 161 feet, and connect at regular intervals with the dining halls. Each ward is provided with a bath-room and water-cloost, and will contain fifty beds. Between each two beds there is a window. At the eastern end of the wards are located the kitchons, laundry, and steward's department, at antached to which are two large yards.

Between the dining hall', and on either side of the medical department, is an open space, 71 feet by 300 feet, and running at right angles with these are similar yards, of the same dimensions, in the contres of which are two lands and dissecting apartment. Each ward has a yard on either side, thus completely isolating it, except where it joins the diluing hall. At one end of the latter are the smoking halls for convelescent patients. All the water, for the whole establishment, used for cooking and bathing purposes, will be supplied from one atomacholier picaed mid way between the kitchene buildings.
