The Missouri State Convention JEFFERSON CITY, Missonri, June 10 .- In the Conver tion to-day, the bill defining the qualifications of voter was passed by a vote of 42 year to 27 nays. The first section of this bill prevents all persons who have been engaged in the rebellion since the 17th of December last from voting at any State election hereafter. The second section provides that before any person shall be elected or appointed to office he shall take oath that he has not, during the present rebellion, wilfully taken up arms or levied war against the United States nor against the Provisional Government of Missouri, nor adhered to the enemies of either. The third section prescribes the nepalty for falsely taking the cath, which is that of the penalty for falsely taking the oath, which is that of perjury. The fourth section contains an oath of alegience, which is required to be taken by the president professors, and curators of the University of Missouri, by eil bask officers, by common school teachers, who are paid by public money, by school trustees, by officers of incorporated companies, and life need or ordained preachers before performing the coremony of marriage; the ponalty for not complying is a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$200—to take effect in ninely days. The fifth section requires the judges and clerks of elections to swear that they will not receive nor record vates from persons who have not taken the oath. The sixth section authorizes the Legislature to repeal or modify these provisions when expedient visions when expedient
The ordinance for continuing the present Governor,
Secretary of State and Treasurer in office was taken up,
and elicited a spirited discussion. A substitute was offered to continue the whole Provisional dovernment, and postpone all elections till the next Gubernatorial e adment was proposed authorizing the Gover-an election, if he bulieves the welfare of the Et*te requires it, before 1864: Pending the discussion, the Convention adjourned. FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

THE MONEY MARKET.

PHILADELPHIA, June 11, 1862. There has been considerable talk among the newspapers relative to the proposed issue of Government small bills. All of them seem to concur in the opinion hat such an issue would be a benefit to the Governmen the people, and the commercial interests of the country. out give no figures to support their position. Perha a few facts in the shape of figures would not be out of place. At the close of the year 1861, the circulation of the banks of the United States, including the average estimate of the Southern States, was about one hundred and eighty three millions. Without any reference to the use of the proposed issue in the secreded States, where, of course, it will not circulate for some time to come, we aball deal with the figures as presented above, or at least that proportion of them which will cover the issue of small notes. In the Southern States but few of them are issued, and allowing that one-quarter (which is above the proportion) of the entire circulation of the United States is issued in small notes, we have about forty-five millions of these paper promises, a sum less in smount than the proposed treasury issue. Now, we can confidently say that the New England, Middie, and Western States are actually floeded with this issue, and already are the small notes of our city banks at a discount, simply because of an overupply. In many cases the banks refuse their own notes, after a certain hour in the day. Throughout Pennsylvatheir small notes. How then will the treasury issue be no better than the notes of a good bank, and it is a wellown fact that country people have a special liking for the notes of a bank in their own neighborhood, and can rarely be induced to take any others. This feeling is nniversal among farmers, and all classes of men outside of city limits. Besides, no one would take small notes to put away, if they could get the large. We must conclude, therefore, that the small notes will, and must be kept continually in circulation, and as the circulation will not extend to the country, it, of course, will be forced upon the cities, upon cities already deluged with notes of like us. What will be the result when this pro posed is ue is thrown upon the market? The fact of the banks refusing to redeem, or accept their own issues on deposit will cause a depreciation of their currency; and as many will seek that of the United States in preference, the bank paper will be considerably ignored and much suffering to poor people and the smaller class of storekeepers will be the result. The United States can issue enough five and ten-dollar notes to satisfy her wants. They would be eagerly and senerally sought: but to turn fifty millions of small promises to pay upon the public would, we fear, bring many to think upon the Continental currency of a forner period and cause many to avoid it. To be sure, the ebts of the United States could be paid with these notes; for the seldlers they would be admirable; but our armies could not absorb a tenth of them in months, and as many would be sent to their families (living where they were lready a drug), we can see nothing but depreciation ahead. There is such a thing as glutting the marketcongestion and death are often the result of a plethora. We do not object to Government issues, but, only to the little f-rms of it; and if distrust grows upon a too great familiarity—as it sometimes does—the mauses may take fright, and their refusing may cause a flutter in Secretary Chase's financial bosom, which might cause him paper currency, and banks have been ruined for loss reasons than having too much paper affort.
