From Colonel Josiah Harlan and Charlain Whitaker, of the 13th Pennselvani Cavalry, valuable aid has been received. The opportunities of distributing Bibles, tracts, and books of a mora religious character are slmost unlimited, anything readable being seized with avidity. Be it enacled by the Senate and House of Repre-sentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of War be authorized to add to it o medical department of the army medical storekeepers, not exceeding six in number, who shall have the pay and emoluments of military storekeepers in the quartermaster's department, who shall be skilled apothecaries or druggists, who shall give the bond and security required by existing laws for military store-keepers in the quartermaster's department, and who shall be stationed at such points as the necessities of the army may require: Provided, That the provisions of this act shall remain in force only during the continu-ance of the present rebellion.
