As the most circut and cheapest way to obtain it, Mr. Scentary Chase has asked for a new issue of treasury notes, and the Committee of Ways and Means, of the House of Representatives, have reported in favor of the House of Representatives. They look more like money than common "bauk-rags," and based as they are upon the entire wealth of the country, their intrinsic value and their recemption are secure. They have, in fact, more of the essential elements of real money than any other aubstitute for coin that the wit of man has ever devised. With coin and a definite amount, say three or even four hundred millious of treasury notes, and no other paper issues in circulation, the United States would, in our judgment, have the best circulating medium possible, for an agricultural, manufacturing and commercial people. ommercial people.

"But it is sadly to be feared that the opportunity for "But it is saily to be feared that the opportunity for Congress to provide such a currency is to pass by with-out improvement. There are some two thousand banks vigorously at work consetting with the Gavernment in the issae of currency. Using the legal tender notes instead of coin for the redemption of their issaes, and nearly all of them in a state of suspension, at best there is practically no limit to their ability and disposition to utter their 'promises to pay.' As yet all this is very beautiful. Money is plenty.
